

IFC gives LAW \$25,000

The Incidental Fee Committee Thursday approved a \$24,000 special request to bring the 1992 Nobel Peace Prize winner and other speakers to a University law

student groups' conference. Rigoberta Menchu, winner of the 1992 Nobel Peace Prize, will address the 1993 Public Interest Environmental Law Conference, said conference Co-chairman David Evans.

Dave Foreman, founder of the environmental action group Earth First! will also attend the conference, Evans said.

In addition to Menchu as d Foreman, about 75 representatives of native peoples from around the world will participats, Evans said.

Private donors usually pay conference participants travel expenses, but the tight economy has dried-up those sources of funding, he said.

In other business Thursday, the IFC approved budget requests for the Jewish Student Union and KWVA, the University's radio sta-

The IFC allocated \$4,080 to next year's JSU budget, a 15.7 increase from this year's budget.

The JSU plans to use the budincrease to improve YAVNEH, its journal of Jewish cultural life, said JSU Co-director Andrew Waxman.

KWVA, the University's campus radio station received \$35,661, a 25 percent decrease from their present budget.

KWVA asked for less money because most of their expensive equipment was bought over the past two years, said KWVA board member Michael O'Leary.

Monday night, the IFC approved budget requests for the

Black Student Union and the Associated Students for Historic Prevention.

The IFC allocated \$455 to the ASFHP, a 107 percent increase from this year's budget of \$220.

The BSU received \$12,191, a 13.2 percent increase from this year's budget. In 1992's IFC allocations, the BSU received a 6.7 percent decrease.

Leslie Warren, BSU president, proposed and received an increase in postage allocations. The reason for an increase in postage money is so the BSU can print a newsletter.


Warren also said the group would like to see a commencement exercise specifically for African-American students.

The purpose of the commencement exercise is to help the University retain more of its black students, she said.

Although the commencement exercise was not part of the BSU's budget request, IFC member Lydia Lerma made a motion that \$100 be given as incentive for the new commencement procedure.
