California case may question school's fees

 University awaits possible action at federal level

University officials are waiting to see if the U.S. Supreme Court will hear a California Supreme Court case before they

consider changing how student political and lobbying groups in Oregon are fund-

"We're going to have to look at it really closely to determine whether it has any implications for Oregon," said Melinda Grier, director of legal services for the Oregon State System of Higher Education.

At issue is a recent California high court decision that said forcing students to fund campus political and lobbying groups is unconstitutional. The case does not affect Oregon law at present, but if appealed to the U.S. Supreme Court, its outcome could severely restrict the amount of money politically oriented campus groups receive from mandatory student fees.

"I'm not here to make you like me," Ice-T said during a Friday lecture in the EMU Ballroom. "At the end of the night, some of you won't like me, but at least you'll know why you don't like me.

Too many people don't like Ice-T because of an erroneous image that the media have portrayed about him, he said. The rapper made headlines last year because of the song "Cop Killer" that he sang with his heavy metal group Body Count

Ice-T eventually voluntarily pulled the song off of the band's album, but not until after he was wrongly labeled as a hateful person, especially when it came to all police, he said.

The media took two seconds of my life and said this who is I am," Ice-T said. Ice-T called "Cop Killer" a protest song

and said he didn't realize how potentially volatile it could be.

'I didn't think 'Cop Killer' was a controversial record. I swear to God," he said. "Everybody I know hates the cops."

'Cop Killer" - though interpreted to be a song against all law enforcement is specifically dedicated to the Los Angeles Police Department, but Ice-T said the riots that followed the acquittal of the four LAPD officers named in the Rodney King beating proved a point.

"The scary thing is that 12 people in a box found them innocent," he said. "The system doesn't work.
