# Anderson best hope for wrestlers in Iowa

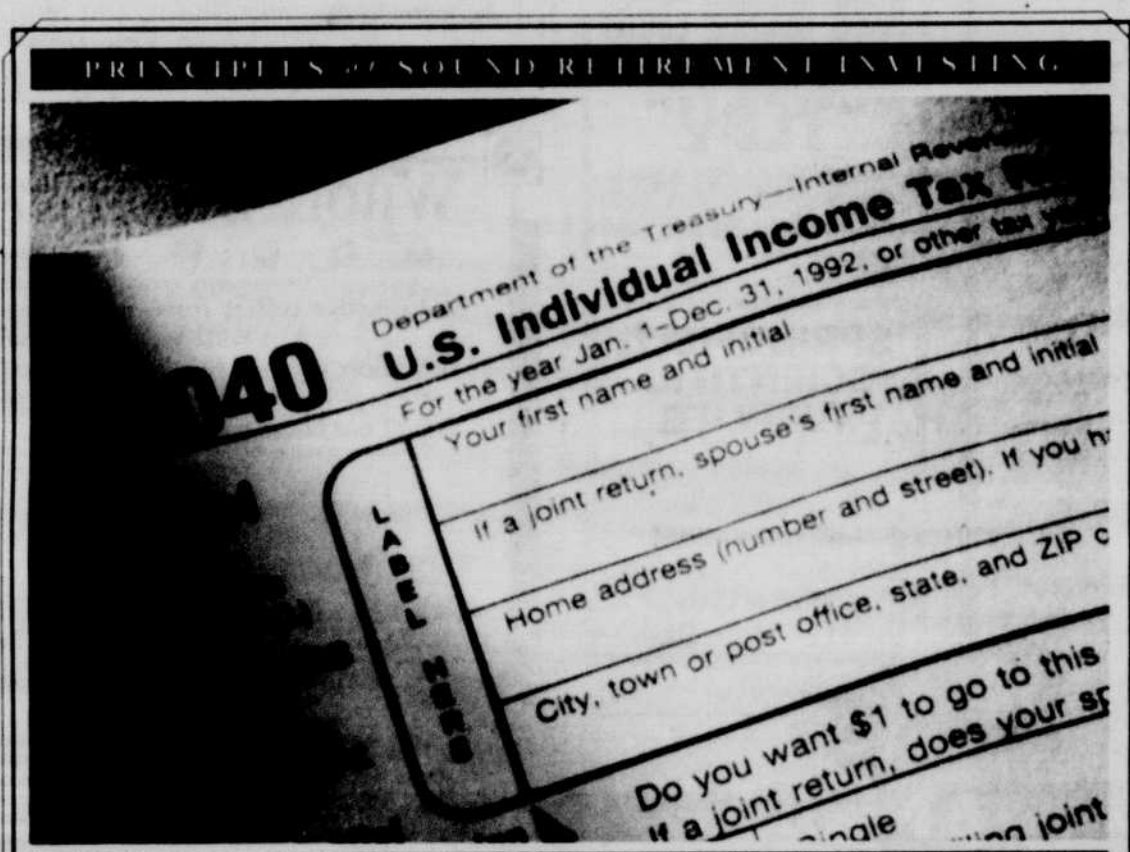

Williams' three-pointer at 3:23 made the score 73-71. Stoudamire scored off a steal to make the score 75-73, and Stoudamire hit a three of his own to keep the game within two at

78-76.

But after Bear forward Alfred Grigsby missed a baseline jumper with 32 seconds left, Oregon was playing for the final shot of the game when Williams and Collier miscued, turning the ball over with 16 seconds remaining.
