

Foreign Language Teacher Preparation at the University of Oregon

The University of Oregon's College of Education is now accepting applications for its post-baccalaureate teaching license program in French, German, Japanese, and Spanish. Graduates are certified to teach their language specialization, kindergarten through twelfth grade, in Oregon and other states. Students start the program Summer '93 and complete it the following Spring. (Other options may be possible.) Program coursework can be applied toward an interdisciplinary master's degree in foreign language teaching.

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Walker: That's not our plan. I was sorry to see the NCAA start to allow Division I schools to keep six men's teams and eight women's teams. That's not what we'd like to do; we want to provide opportunity, not take opportunity away.

ODE: It is already difficult to fund the 14 teams Oregon now has. How will Oregon fund the additional women's team?

Walker: Rich (Brooks, the Oregon athletic director) has already talked to me about getting very involved in a fund-raising effort to raise money for a new sport. Any time you add a new sport, your field of interest broadens; there are a lot of soccer enthusiasts in the state; there are a lot of swimming enthusiasts. Those are groups of people we haven't tapped.

ODE: Another proposal in the resolution calls for, on a conference and national level, the elimination of athletic scholarships for people who already have the means to go to college. Is there any chance this may happen in the future?

Walker: I think there is a strong chance nationally. It won't happen unless it happens nationally. I think in the next year you will hear some concrete proposals about need-based aid.

Athletic departments are running deficits, and one of the major costs is the grant-in-aid. We're going to have to look at where we're spending our money and at ways to cut back without eliminating opportunities.

Again, we're trying to be pro-active by having a gender equity policy on our campus, but we're also waiting to see what happens nationally.
