from her specialty, the 400-meter run, to win the 200 in 24.18.

Hamilton took time out from signing autographs to win the 800-meter run in a modest 2:08.14. Hamilton set the pace from the start and won by a comfortable margin over Weber State's Shawna Cox.

Hamilton, a former Wisconsin star, said she was running in Eugene to "toughen up."

"I did a workout about a week ago, and it was hailing. It was the hardest weather I had ever run

in. I just think about that day and know I can handle anything now," Hamilton said. "It makes you tougher to run here, that's for sure. I'm enjoying it and I feel like I'm getting stronger and tougher."

Hamilton, who has been training in Eugene for several weeks, said there were several reasons she chose to run at the Oregon Invitational rather than the larger Mount SAC meet in Los Angeles.

"I don't want to travel a lot, the meet was right here, my coach is here, and my husband came to visit me," Hamilton said. "Everything was in my favor to be here."
