Duck relay teams hit top marks at meets

The Oregon men's and women's track and field teams prepared for this weekend's Pepsi Team Invitational by turning in some season-best times at the Drake and Penn relays during the weekend.

The men's 4x100- and 4x400-meter relay teams each set seasonbest marks. The 4x100 team of DeWayne Ingram, LaVon Pierce, Patrick Khoo and Ronnie Harris finished fifth in the finals at the Drake Relays in Des Moines, Iowa, with a time of 40.54.

Khoo, Pierce, Harris and Grady O'Connor teamed up to take sixth in the 4x400 race with a time of 3:09.03.

At the Penn Relays in Philadelphia, the quartet of Lisa Bedwell. LaReina Woods, Kelly Blair and Camara Jones ran Oregon's fastest time in 12 years in the 4x400 event with a 3:36.49, earning them an NCAA provisional qualifying mark. Unfortunately, with the high caliber of teams competing in the event, the Ducks failed to qualify for the finals.

Oregon's Julie Beck also got an NCAA provisional qualifying mark in the discus with a throw of 167-10 at the Drake Relays. Friday, Duck Ashley Selman won the javelin in Iowa. Selman, the former NCAA champion in the javelin, has already qualified for the NCAA championships.

The men did not fare as well at the Penn Relays, finishing eighth in the 6,000 relay with a time of 15:23.59 and 12th in the 4x800meter relay with a time of 7:48.88.

In the women's 3,200-meter relay at the Drake Relays, the team of Tyrza Hunt, Erika Klein, Jenna Carlson and Nicole Woodward finished fourth with a time of 8:57.56.

The Oregon teams will be in action at the Pepsi Team Invitational at Hayward Field this weekend. Washington State, Arizona State and Kansas State will join Oregon in the final team scoring event of the season for the Ducks.

the depth chart come Sept. 4 when Oregon opens its season at Colorado State.

O'Neil started quickly, throwing three touchdown passes in the first quarter alone.

The first went for 37 yards to receiver Cristin McLemore. Moments later, O'Neil threw an 83-yard touchdown pass to senior Derrick Deadwiler, and the two hooked up again for a 46-yard touchdown to give the Green team a 21-0 lead.

Tailback Sean Burwell scored on a one-yard run to put Green up 28-0, before tailback Ricky Whittle took a Graziani pass 62

yards for a touchdown and the White team's first score of the day.

Graziani connected on a 24yard pass to freshman Dameron Ricketts for his team's only other score of the game.

Deadwiler caught one more touchdown pass and finished the day with six catches for 188 yards, proving to be Oregon's hands-down No. 1 receiver going into next season.

Oregon's defense made the offense's job a little easier. The first-team defense was without linemen Romeo Bandison and Silila Malepeai, linebacker David Massey, cornerbacks Alex Molden and Herman O'Berry, and safety Chad Cota.
