ave you ever taken notice of the house on the corner of University Street and 13th Avenue. It's the one that used to be painted yellow, but is now tan with a brown trim. The same house that students have seen in Animal House and passed by many times on the way to class or the EMU without taking notice to it or questioning what it is today.

Well, that house is actually a cafe for students and faculty called the Collier House Cafe and Faculty Club.

The house has been on 13th Avenue for quite awhile. It was the third building on campus, which before the Collier House, contained only Villard and Deady Halls. Today the building is being used for much more than it ever has before. Not only is the Collier House a cafe, but it is also available for weddings, receptions, banquets, workshops and conferences.

The restaurant opens at 8 a.m. for coffee and serves lunch starting from 11:30 a.m. until 6 p.m.

Joan McDonald, who is head chef and manager, has been working there for 15 years and says her daily special and fresh homemade soups are the best in Eugene.

The menu for the catering service is almost as good as the daily lunch menu. The catering menu has an assortment of possibilities ranging from a pineapple boat filled with fresh fruit salad topped with frozen yogurt, to an italian spicy calabrese sausage sandwich with mozzarella on an onion roll. Many of the items are vegetarian, and all are very reasonably priced.

"I really enjoy going in there between classes and getting some homemade food and hanging out, then when its time to go to class again, I'm right there," said senior Kristie Oh.

The house has been restored over the past few years. Almost all of the furniture is donated by the local community to fit the age and time period of the house.

For example, the 10-person dining room set valued at over \$16,000 was donated by a Eugene resident. Students enjoy dropping in when between classes to sit at a couch and get a cup of coffee while reading a book or a magazine.

McDonald wants students to "feel casual and comfortable about using the place,'

"One woman comes in periodically and brings us her magazines after they have been read,' McDonald said.

At this point the traffic through the Collier House is mostly faculty. The cafe serves from 80-100 customers per day. McDonald encourages stu-
