Women cruise in Boise meet

The Oregon women's track team remained undefeated in team competition this season as the Ducks outscored Weber State, Boise State and Colorado State in a four-way meet Saturday in Boise. Oregon won despite the absence of Kelly Blair,

who remained in Eugene resting a back injury. The injury isn't expected to force Blair to miss the Pacific-10 Conference multi-event championships

LaReina Woods ran the 100-meter sprint in a wind-aided 11.59 for a narrow victory over teammate Camara Jones, who finished in 11.62. Both times are NCAA provisional qualifying marks. Jones returned later in the meet to win the 200meter sprint in 23.80.

While gusting winds aided the sprinters, the conditions slowed the distance runners. Duck runners still dominated, however, as Nicole Woodward won the 1,500-meter run and Jenna Carlson won the 3,000-meter. In fact, Oregon swept the top three places in the 3,000, as Niamh Zwagerman and Heidi Van Borkulo-Goldstein took second and third, respectively.

Erika Klein was able to record an NCAA provisional qualifying time in the 800 by clocking a 2:08.14 to take second behind Weber State's Shawna Cox. Cox set the Bronco Stadium record by winning in 2:07.79

Thrower Julie Beck won both the discus and the shot put for the second week in a row. Beck's shot put of 48-1 was her best throw since the indoor season and qualified her for the NCAA outdoor meet. Beck, who had already qualified for the NCAA meet in the discus by throwing 167-10 at the Drake Relays, won the event in Boise by more than 20 feet by throwing 160-1.

The Oregon 4x400-meter relay avenged an early season loss to Weber State by winning in 3:45.4. The 4x100-meter relay team also won, giving Lisa Bedwell and Jamila Godfrey two relay wins for the

The Ducks dominated the javelin, taking the top four places. Ashley Selman won the event in 160-1. closely followed by teammates Tonia Roth. Kelsey Stellick and Keri Esterbrook.

Blair's absence from the meet allowed Amo Olson to shine in the high jump. Olson won the event by clearing 5-7

Oregon's final tune-up before the Pac-10 meet in Berkeley, Calif., will be at Hayward Field next week as Oregon is host to the annual Twilight


