
Football team racks up 'Mimsies'

Secondly, the firing of



• The Charles Barkley "I'mnot-a-role-model" Award — To the members of the Oregon football team who have found it tough to stay out of trouble in the past 12 months. At least nine members of the team have been cited by police or disciplined by the team since last spring.
