The Olympic-style games are being held for the first time in the United States. The games are the world's second-biggest athletic competition after the Summer Olympics, making the event a prime target for potential terrorists, authorities said.

You prepare obviously for the worst, and hope for the best," said Thomas Coyle, who heads the FBI in Buffalo.

About 50 law-enforcement agencies in New York and Canada are participating in security efforts, directed by State Police Superintendent Thomas Constantine and Inspector Salvatore

At the 1972 Olympics in Munich, 11 Israeli athletes were killed by Arab terrorists at the athlete's village.

That memory, plus the recent terrorist bombing of the World Trade Center and the arrests of terrorists who plotted to kill U.S. officials, have prompted police to take extra security measures.

"It's scary," Valvo said. "It brings it home that these things do occur in America. No country is immune to terrorist

About 1,000 police officers will patrol games sites each day. Valvo said. The games are being held Thursday through July 18 at two dozen sites around western New York and southern Ontario, including Rich Stadium in Orchard Park and Pilot Field and Memorial Auditorium in Buffalo

Security tight at University Games

New York allocated \$5 million to pay overtime for local police, and one-sixth of the 4,000-member state police will work on games security.

The Defense Department gave \$9 million to help pay for games security and provided high-tech surveillance and communications equipment.

The FBI has trained 150 agents and police as a special weapons and tactics unit in case of a terrorist attack. Extra FBI agents have been sent to Buffalo from Cleveland and Pittsburgh.

State police have fenced off dormitories at the University of Buffalo where thousands of athletes will stay. The dorms are under surveillance by closedcircuit television cameras, and those entering the complex are scanned for weapons.

The State Department has barred 79 Libyan athletes and officials from entering the country because of Libya's links to terrorism.

Primo Nebiolo, who heads the International University Sports Federation that oversees the games, sent a letter to President Clinton on Monday asking him to allow the Libyans to partici-

"Mr. President, you are the one world leader who epitomizes youth and openness toward a new and changing world," Nebiolo wrote. "You, more than anyone, would understand the dreams and aspirations of young people around the world as well as their strong desire to know one another and to become friends beyond any race, color or creed.'

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Belgian sprints into Tour lead

gian Wilfried Nelissen sprinted into the lead of the Tour de France today, winning the day's stage as well as two intermediate sprints.

Nelissen took over the leader's yellow jersey from two-time defending champion Miguel Indurain.

Indurain stayed with the main pack and lost the overall lead to Nelissen, who gained a bonus of 32 seconds during the stage from Les Sables d'Olonne to Vannes in western France.

Nelissen won the final sprint over Uzbekistan's Djamolidine Abdoujaparov, Italy's Mario Cipollini and Germany's Olaf Ludwig.

Tuesday's 118-mile stage is from Vannes to Dinard.

Cipollini won Sunday's leg from Lucon to Les Sables d'Olonne in 4 hours, 52 minutes, 29 seconds in a sprint just ahead of the main pack. Nelis-

sen was second and France's Laurent Jalabert third.

Indurain had the field wondering what he will do next. He was expected to play a waiting game until the first major time trial next week.

"In the stages where the pace accelerates nearing the finish line. I prefer to stay at the head of the pack to avoid the falls,' Indurain said. "I wasn't really looking for the sprint bonus but I felt my principal opponents, notably (Gianni) Bugno, very interested by the thing. I took a certain pleasure playing the game.

Indurain avoided trouble Sunday as several sprinters fell.

American Lance Armstrong finished 20th Sunday in a group four seconds behind Cipollini, but was 82nd overall - 51 seconds behind Indurain.

The Tour continues through July 25, on a 2,312-mile clockwise journey around France.

Major league players hit 23 home runs in 14 games Sunday, two of them by Houston Astro Ed Taubensee. Minorleaguers added 106 homers in 80 games.

Last year, players hit 100 home runs on Independence Day, prompting Coca-Cola USA to donate \$500,000 to youth ballparks. The program was expanded to include the World Series, adding another \$60,000. Fifteen youth organizations in 13 cities have received the funds.

Stern, who played a hapless hoodlum in the Home Alone movies and a henpecked husband in City Slickers, also appears in Rookie of the Year as a bumbling batting coach.

"I don't want to exclude anybody," he said in Sunday's editions of the Daily News of Los Angeles. "So as not to exclude people, I don't have violence ... I don't want sex. I don't want (offensive) language.

"I can tell a funny, warm, romantic, exciting story without those things.
