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will receive a tax rebate in their state income taxes.

Opponents to the measure say the tax demands too much of the poor and the elderly, no matter what provisions the bill adds.

State Rep. Carl Hosticka, D-Eugene, supported the tax by saying it could raise much-needed money for schools and stabilize a state budget in havoc because of fluctuating income from dependence on the income tax.

Bentley said without the sales tax to stabilize schools, the state's future could become hazy because the state could not attract as many income-producing residents without quality public schools.

"With no money for public education to pay for schools, we're not going to attract people in the future," he said.

More restrictions for state sales tax

The following is a list of restrictions legislators have added to Ballot Measure 1, which Oregon residents will be voting on Nov. 9.

The information was produced by the state and given to the *Emerald* by Philip Bentley, state affairs coordinator for the ASUO.

- The sales tax for schools will be on a trial basis. Oregon residents will have to vote for the tax again in the 1998 general election.

The 5 percent tax rate can only be raised by a statewide vote of the people.

Money from the sales tax is dedicated solely for schools with grades kindergarten through 12 and for community colleges. Again, this can only be changed by public vote.

School property taxes would be abolished under the tax, but homeowners will still be asked to pay for school bonds and other government services and bonds.

- The sales tax would not include services.

Exemptions on the tax would include: food, housing, water, light, heat power, prescription medicine, motor fuel, essential services, farm animals, seed and fertilizer. Exemptions can only be changed by a vote of the people.

Cities, counties and local governments cannot impose a sales tax.

Working families, with children, earning less than \$24,000 a year would receive an earned income credit on their income tax.

The corporate income tax would be raised from 6.6 percent to 7.6 percent.

The measure restricts the state's spending authority on the money. Emergency expenditures can be made with a "yes" vote by 60 percent of the Legislature and if approved by the governor.
