"Reggae Master" Jimmy Cliff will headline the Oregon Grind Music Festival, which will take place today on the intramural field between Hayward Field and McArthur Court.

The Renegade Saints, The Strangers, The Daddies, and Calobo will also be featured in this daylong show, which will include political action tables, a food courtyard and a beer garden. The Grind will begin at noon and continue until sunset.

Jimmy Cliff, who has not appeared in Eugene since his 1988 performance at Autzen Stadium with Robert Cray and The Grateful Dead, will be promoting his latest release. Breakout. The Grind's coordinator, Adam Zacks, said he chose Cliff to headline because, "He's really killer live. People may not be buying his albums like they used to, but he's an incredible live performer.'

Cliff, who is originally from Jamaica, has released more than 20 albums. Over the course of his career Cliff has worked with many prominent musicians, including Steve Windwood, Francos Ok Jazz of Ensambo Zaire, The African International Band of

Zaire, and The Grand Zico Band. Bruce Springsteen, Linda Ronstandt and UB40 have covered Cliff's material. In 1985 Cliff's success was recognized by the music industry when he was awarded a Grammy


Zacks said he chose the rest of the bands because "all are premiere local bands" and each has "a large audience in their own right." Zacks hoped The Grind would give each a chance to expand their audience.

The Renegade Saints, who categorize their sound as "Bohemian Boogie Grind," will be appearing fresh from a tour of the Midwest and the Rockies. The band benefited from the tour.

'Minneapolis went particularly well,"guitar player John Shipe said. Shipe also said the Midwest tour helped the band make industry contacts that may lead to a recording contract " Our phones aren't ringing off the hook, but they (the recording executives) said that they thought we were good," he said.
