Wildcats win to stay atop Pac-10

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) — For the second straight week, placekicker Steve McLaughlin has been No. 7 Arizona's winning margin, booting the Wildcats into never-explored territory atop the Pacific 10 Conference.

McLaughlin kicked three field goals Saturday, including one of 32 yards with 1:33 left in a 9-6 win over No. 25 Washington State. His final-second 27-yarder the week before provided a 27-24 win over Stanford.

After his third kick, McLaughlin said: "It's amazing we're finding a way to win. It was a great snap, great hold, good line protection."

Still, the Cougars just missed tying the game when Aaron Price's 49-yard field goal attempt on the last play was just wide left.

Price's 49-yard field goal had put Washington State ahead 3-0, then tied it 6-6 on a 30-yarder late in the third quarter.

Price's father, Washington State coach Mike Price, consoled him after his miss. "He said he will always love me and that he's always on my side and we'll get it next time," Price said.

UCLA 20

Oregon State 17

UCLA head coach Terry Donahue had mixed feelings about his team's nearly disastrous visit to Oregon State.

"The nice thing from our perspective is we came back," he said after his Bruins had to rally in the fourth quarter to beat the Beavers 20-17. "We were behind and we fought back in a tough, hostile environment and we won."

Oregon State, a 20-point underdog, led 17-14 entering the final quarter, but field goals made the difference as the Bruins won their fifth straight to improve to 5-3 overall. UCLA's Bjorn Merten made two from 35 yards in the fourth quarter, then the Beavers' Brooke Knight barely missed one from 31 yards that would have tied the game with 4:22 to play.

Knight and the rest of the Oregon State field goal team thought the kick was good. So did Oregon State coach Jerry Pettibone.

"I tried to walk down the sideline as far back as I could to get as good an angle as I possible could," Pettibone said. "It looked like it went through to me, but I saw it was hooking. The players on the team thought it was good. They felt it was about a

foot or so inside the left upright.

Arizona State 38 Stanford 30

STANFORD, Calif. (AP) — Mario Bates ran for two touchdowns as part of an 18-point fourth quarter and Arizona State rallied past Stanford 38-30 Saturday to snap a three-game losing streak and extend the Cardinal's worst stretch under Bill Walsh.

Stanford (2-5, 0-4 Pac-10) lost its fourth straight, the longest losing streak ever for a Walsh-coached team at Stanford. Walsh, a three-time Super Bowl winner while coaching the San Francisco 49ers, coached at Stanford in 1977 and 1978 and returned for a second tour prior to last season.

Bates rushed 37 times for 127 yards and George Montgomery added 100 yards on 16 carries as the Sun Devils (3-4, 1-3 Pac-10) picked up their first conference victory. Freshman Jake Plummer completed 11 of 22 throws for 200 yards and a touchdown in his first victory as a starter.

Notre Dame 31 USC 13

Notre Dame cruised to its 11th straight win over Southern Cal by a score of 31-13 Saturday in South Bend, Ind. The Irish ground out the victory, rushing for 305 yards compared to 69 for the Trojans.

"I was very impressed with their efficiency and power," said USC head coach John Robinson, who lost to Notre Dame for only the second time in eight tries. "There is no question we are not as strong as they are. We just weren't a match for them."

Lee Becton, slowed by a pulled hamstring earlier this season, had his third straight 100-yard plus rushing day for the Irish. The junior tailback gained a career-high 177 yards on 20 carries, including a 70-yard TD run on the second play from scrimmage.

But much of the postgame focus was on quarterback Paul Failla.

Failla, subbing for ailing starter Kevin McDougal, spent most of the afternoon handing off to Becton and Notre Dame's other running backs. But he also completed 6 of 9 passes, including a 29-yard touchdown to Ray Zellars, and directed a turnover-free offense.

Volleyball loses two games in L.A.

The Oregon volleyball team was its predictable self this weekend: surprisingly good against an excellent opponent, but unable to improve its record.

The bright spot in Oregon's

weekend road trip to Southern California was a four-game loss to undefeated, No. 1 ranked UCLA on Saturday. The Bruins won by a score of 15-13, 15-10, 13-15, 15-8.

"We played very well. We came the closest to beating UCLA at their place that we ever have since I've been the coach here. That's a very tough place to play," head coach Gerry Gregory said.

Leading performers in the match included: quick hitter Karissa Meith, who had 20 kills; quick hitter Angee Henderson, 18 kills and a .357 hitting percentage; and swing hitter LaReina Woods, 14 digs.

"Angee Henderson was unstoppable as a hitter. Karissa Meith played great for us. LaReina Woods had a very good match against UCLA. Also, Amy McNeel came out of a slump and played well for us," Gregory said.

Gregory was pleased with the way his team responded following a disappointing 15-7, 15-11, 15-6 loss to USC on Friday.

"In the last two weeks, we've played four matches, and three have them have been really solid performances. We've competed hard and performed well. The only exception was USC, where we played well beneath our capabilities," he said.
