

Softball coach Brown wins title

niversity of oregon head softball coach Tami Brown was a member of this year's ASA Women's Major Fastpitch National Championship team from Redding, Calif.

The Redding Rebels took the championship in dramatic style as they swept past the 23-time national champion Raybestos Brakettes, 3-0 and 3-2, in Stratford, Conn. in September. For the Rebels, defeating the Brakettes in the championship was a revenge victory of sorts. Last year,

the Brakettes beat the Rebels in Redding to win the championship.

Rebels pitcher Michele Smith got the victory in the final game, and she was named the tournament's Most Valuable Player, as well as being named "Best Pitcher". For the Rebels, it was Jennifer Brundage's single in the seventh inning that plated first baseman Kelly Jackson, giving them

Seven of the 14 players for the Rebels were named ASA all-Americans, including Smith, Brundage, pitcher Lori Sippel and Julie Smith.

Redding finished the tournament with a 7-1 record, including a 28-inning, seven-hour victory over the California Commotion.
