Society Folklore picks Eugene for conference site

Chain saw sculpting and the Saturday Market will be among a wide range of topics discussed at a national Folklore conference held in Eugene this week

More than 800 folklorists from around the world will attend the annual meeting sponsored by the American Folklore Society, according to University Folklore Director Sharon Sherman.

Hundreds of presentations on subjects such as folk healing in Southwest and dealing with unemployment will be given at the conference — the largest in the nation.

'This is really big," Sherman said, who was recently nominated and elected to the Executive Board of the AFS. "This is big. not only for our Folklore department, but for our community.

'It is a bit rare that a community the size of Eugene would get a convention like this," Laura Danielson said, a Lane Community College folklore instructor, who will fiddle at a dance held during the con-

These folklorists will see Armstrong's ornate wood sculpturing, and tour the fivestory house constructed by Armstrong.

Thursday through Saturday, folklorists will attend presentations ranging from forums to videotapes and films on varying aspects of folklore.

The special theme for this upcoming conference will be, "Folklore, Civil Rights and Social Justice." Many of the presentations will deal with ethnical perspectives in Folklore.


The conference will conclude on Sun-

The American Folklore Society decided upon Eugene after its 1987 meeting in Albuquerque, New Mexico.

We organized the program for that meeting, and it was in the middle of nowhere," Sherman said. "Once we got back, I wrote to the AFS about Eugene as a possible site for the folklore conference. They wrote back to say they would love to meet in Eugene - not only because Eugene is such a wonderful place, but because the Folklore program at the UO was one of the top programs in the nation."


