God's eye view

In two recent letters (ODE, Oct. 19, Oct. 22), Damon Cole introduces the Emerald readers to "objectivism," the philosophy of Ayn Rand. In many respects, Rand's beliefs are interesting because she placed a high value on logic and reason. Unfortunately, her faith in human reasoning powers was so strong that it led her to place all problems, including politics, economics, culture and art on exactly the same plane as simple Newtonian physics.

In these areas, the philosophy of "objectivism" actually makes real objectivity impossible. The objectivist, convinced that reason has led to a sort of, "God's eye view" of the truth, cannot appreciate the possibility that other people's viewpoints on political and cultural issues may be just as valid as his or her own.

Damon's letters are a caricature of the worst aspects of Rand's thinking processes. He argues that anyone who discusses potential problems with genetic engineering is advocating ugliness and death, and that Nazism and fascism were motivated by altruism. These arguments are so silly that I won't waste space to refute them.

Indeed, readers of Damon's letters might be tempted to conclude that Rand and her followers are simply nuts and fruitcakes. This would be un fortunate, because Rand was a great novelist, and her words of praise for the creative potential of individual human beings have inspired millions. However, Rand was also a tragic figure and her philosophy, evaluated objectively, has some very serious limitations.


