Police now hiring cadets for summer

The Oregon State Police are now accepting applications for the 1994 Summer Park Cadet Program.

The program includes working along the beaches, in parks, leading tours, enforcing traffic and investigating crime. Sgt. Aaron T. Olsen said the Oregon State Police has had a summer employment cadet program since 1970, and besides offering summer jobs, the cadet program protects Oregon's beaches and state parks.

Last summer, the police received more than 1,000 applications for the positions, but only 51 cadets are needed for the pro-

gram. Olsen said they are looking for people who are at least 18 years of age, have a high-school degree and a valid driver's license.

Further, the applicants must have no felony convictions, and a good character. The applicants are selected through a written exam, and then an interview.

The employment runs from mid-June through the first week of September, and the starting salary is \$7.83 per hour. The deadline for applications is Dec. 31, and applications may be picked up at any Oregon State Police office.

He cites the Oregon Economic Development Department's findings that recent growth in Oregon exports to United States border nations indicate strong markets for Oregon products, which would only be improved further with NAFTA's passage.

"Trade, generally, and trade with Mexico and Canada specifically, benefits Oregon, a situation NAFTA will only improve," Kopetski said.

As a member of the powerful House Ways and Means Committee, Kopetski has been recruited to generate support for the pact among his House colleagues.

However, 4th District Congressman Peter DeFazio, fails to share Kopetski's optimism.

"NAFTA supporters are painting the agreement as a bold step into a bright economic future," DeFazio said. "It sounds more like a prescription for economic dislocation in the U.S. as hundreds of thousands of family wage jobs move south (into Mexico)."

NAFTA negotiations were concluded in the final days of President Bush's administration and handed off to President-elect

Clinton. While Clinton supports the trade pact, his administration spent the last several months working to diminish Congressional concern over NAFTA.

Mickey Kantor, Clinton's chief negotiator on trade matters, worked out side agreements with Mexico to improve labor and environmental standards and to protect American markets against import surges.

Yet it appears the now completed side agreements may not have accomplished all President Clinton and Kantor may have hoped for. Many members of Congress and industry officials still are not fully satisfied.

"I support free and fair trade," 1st District Rep. Elizabeth Furse said, "but I cannot support NAFTA because the side agreements do not adequately address food and road safety issues. While this is a flawed agreement, we must continue to work to develop trade bills that benefit our region, our industries and its employees."

One legislative aide explained that the rift in Oregon's delegation is symbolic of the uphill battle facing all supporters of NAFTA. Congressional opposition to the pact — as in the Oregon delegation — transcends traditional party loyalties for many Democrats.

While President Clinton relied heavily upon unity among House and Senate Democrats to pass his budget package earlier this year, no clear partisan support exists for NAFTA. Even the House of Representatives Democratic leadership is divided, with Speaker of the House Tom Foley (D-WA) supporting NAFTA, but Democrat Majority Leader Richard Gephardt (D-MO) opposing it.
