

UNIVERSITY UPDATE

• Two University students, chosen from candidates across the nation, have received scholarships after their fraternity chapter nominated them.

Sigma Phi Epsilon members Kyle Gano, a chemistry major, and Eric Johnston, an English major, were chosen as recipients of the Zollinger Scholar awards, which are scholarships given to 28 individuals nationwide on the basis of academic achievement and activity within the chapter and on campus.

Zollinger Scholar winners receive a scholarship for their junior year, and if a 2.5 GPA is maintained, another scholarship is awarded for their senior year.

As a senior, Gano was awarded \$400, and Johnston, a junior, received \$250.

• The University Lambda Chi Alpha chapter collected 885 pounds of food in one day last term as part of the largest single-day fraternity philanthropic project ever completed.

"Brothers Feeding Others" was the theme of the 1993 North American Food Drive, which involved more than 8,000 members and 150 chapters from Quebec to California.

• Five University students who competed in the campus-

wide College Bowl tournament last term have been selected to represent the University at the regional contest this winter.

Tim Blackman, S.W. Conser, Robert Farley, Randy Lahr and

Jon Tucker were named to the College Bowl All-Star Team and will compete against eight other teams from four Northwestern states at Linfield College Feb. 26. If they fare well at the

regional event, the students could compete in the national competition at Florida State University later this spring.

The contest is based on the popular *College Bowl* television series of the 1950s and 1960s. Teams of four players race against time to answer questions on topics ranging from history, literature and science to current events, music and sports.

The five winners competed on separate teams, but were selected for the regional competition because they answered the largest percentage of questions correctly out of the 176 individuals entered. Forty-four teams from residence halls and off-campus competed for two weeks before the winners were selected.

• Two teams of University computer and information science students competed against 34 West Coast teams last term in the Western Regionals of the Association for Computing Machinery Programming Contest on campus last month.
