Ducks tune up for Pac-10 with a win

Oregon had fun Monday night, and they should have because it won't get any easier the rest of the season.

The Ducks got their third win in four games, beating Alaska Fairbanks 100-71 at McArthur Court. The Ducks were never really threatened by the Division II Nanooks from the north, and the only questions at the end of the game was whether Oregon would reach triple digits, and when Zach Sellers' bank shot insured this would happen, the crowd of 5,233 made its most noise of the night.

"It was a game that helps us in preparation and executing in game situations," said Oregon forward Jeff Potter, who scored 14 points and grabbed four rebounds. "It's something where we can get game experience get a win and get some confidence."

Oregon finished its non-conference schedule 4-5, but it will get much tougher when the Pacific-10 Conference schedule begins Thursday night at UCLA.

Oregon got ahead early and never faded, thanks mostly to good ballhandling. The Ducks went the first 14 minutes without a turnover and finished with only two total in the first half. Oregon had only seven turnovers for the game, compared to the Nanooks 24.

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

More importantly, players were starting to step up. Lyden, Damon Runyon and the healed leff Potter started to join Orlando Williams as playing the role of seasoned veterans on the squad. Point guard Kenya Wilkins showed he could score points. knocking down 23 against Portland.

The night before New Year's Eve, the Ducks played their best and most important game of the year thus far, breaking a 27-game road losing streak to Division I
