'If people would just get off his back, he'd be able to do his job," said Dale Dickson, a retired fire captain. He was the only Packwood supporter to stand on in front of the West Sixth Avenue mill with a pro-Packwood sign.

'He's not a Kennedy or Clinton and he didn't rape or molest anyone," said Dickson. "His hormones got the better of him ... (the women) turned him down, and he took a cold shower."

Any Packwood support was drowned out by cries for the senator's resignation.

Peter Robinson of the Eugene

Peace Works said, "It's about time for Bob Packwood to realize that he's being a disgrace to the people in Oregon.

Robinson carried a sign saying, 'Grope me, and I'll 'Bob-it' you! Resign Bob.

Another sign holder said Pack-wood shouldn't resign, but the man didn't approve of the senator's alleged actions.

'If he goes away, the whole problem goes away," said businessman, Lee Duncan. "I believe he has a right to a hearing."

Duncan held a sign that said, 'If it's OK to kill unborn children, then why isn't it OK to kiss women.

He said his sign and Pack-

wood's troubles represent a societal problem about the way we treat women and examine issues surrounding women.

One of the senator's supporters said Oregon still needs Packwood because of his influential voice on timber issues

Virgil Fullbright, who owns a small mill near Eugene, said Packwood is a "good strong voice for the timber industry. He's not

sold out the industry yet."
Fullbright pointed to the protesters and said that kids like that don't understand the state's economic and job issues.

"People like me, we pay our taxes and know someone has to pay the bill," said the mill owner


