
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Announcing the Opening of the New Agate Apartments

but added that no action would be taken until later meetings.

The organization will begin working meetings starting Monday at 5 p.m. where the actual plan will be drafted.

Eric Bowen, ASUO president, said the proposal to restructure the committee will be finalized by the end of the month.

The outline for the new fee committee includes three subcommittees that deal directly with the budgets of student programs. A larger committee will oversee the final budget and set how much each student will pay in incidental fees.

The University administration has called for new rules governing the student fee committee for several years now, fearing that excessive control by the IFC could damage the quality of University programs.

At a weekend retreat last November, student leaders from the ASUO, IFC and the EMU Board worked out the current model to be finalized this month. Several students who attended the meeting said they were concerned the new model only represented a new name for an old problem.

"The issue is micromanagement and not the new model," Lee said. "I can replace the names to the IFC and it will be the same problem."

Huckaba said that the difference would be in the checks and balances that could remove political bickering as it arises.

He agrees with Lee that the IFC's tinkering with program funding for political reasons was harmful

That's why the new model was proposed, he said.
Ross Freeman-Jones, a student attending the
meeting, suggested that more communication

should be developed between the larger body and

the subcommittees.

Freeman-Jones and other students attending said that one of the biggest problems now is the lack of communication between the IFC and the larger groups the IFC funds.

Currently, a member of the IFC also votes on the EMU Board. No members of the board are represented on the IFC.

finally a woman asked him to define an effective senator and whether he would rate himself as one.

"My definition of an effective senator is 'Can you go to another senator, argue a position and have a chance of getting him or her to adopt the position?"" Packwood said.

He said he expected to do that numerous times on health care proposals in his position as ranking Republican on the Senate Finance Committee.

Packwood's staff did not announce his Rotary Club appearance to the media until 45 minutes before the luncheon began.

Earlier Thursday, Packwood made a brief appearance at an unfinished library project in Philomath. More than 100 people mingled outside the library, many of them carrying signs that said such things as "Keep Your Tongue In Your Mouth" and "Pack It Up Bob."

A handful of people carried signs supporting the senator.

About 200 people were jammed inside the library. Some

of those in the crowd shouted for him to resign, while others urged him to hang onto his Senate post. He did not respond to the shouts.

Packwood helped library sup-

porters obtain a federal waiver that allowed volunteers to work on the project without getting union wages. He told the crowd it was that kind of work that he will look back on with pride.

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


