will let you run your halfcourt offense."

Saturday the Ducks will face Arizona State. The Sun Devils have defeated Oregon seven times in a row, but head coach Bill Frieder is expecting a tough game from the Ducks.

"They're playing well and they have decent balance," he said. "I like their front line players

and their guards are steady. They play a lot of players which gives them a depth advantage against us."

Oregon's offense, although far from being where Green would like it to be, has slowly improved in the past couple of weeks. The Ducks now have three players (Jeff Potter, Orlando Williams and Kenya Wilkins) averaging over 10 points a game in Pac-10 play, and forward Darryl Parker is right behind at 9.4 points per game.

backcourt. When Oregon plays Arizona at 7 p.m. Thursday at McArthur Court, Missy Croshaw will again start at point guard, with junior Karen Healea, who scored 16 points against Washington, at the other guard spot.

Runge expects freshman Cindie Edamura, who started at the point in 12 of Oregon's first 13 games, to see significant playing time after coming off the bench.

"I don't think it's fair to not start Karen after the game she had the other night," Runge said. "After Oregon State, I think Eddie (Edamura) felt there was a lot of pressure on her. She's just not physically strong enough to put up with some of the defenders Washington was throwing at her."

The Wildcats, 3-2 and 9-4 overall, bear some resemblance to the Ducks. The two teams are tied for fourth place in the conference. Both teams are senior dominated and led by and underrated forward. Arizona's Kim Conway leads the Pac-10 in field-goal and free-throw per-

centage and is eighth in the conference in scoring and rebounding.

Runge called Arizona "very similar" to Washington in its style of play and intense defense.

"They change defenses more but they play very aggressively," she said. "They look to shoot a lot, so you have to be ready to defend at every opportunity. They like to run, they like to pressure. They're a very talented team," she said.

Oregon plays Arizona State on Saturday. The Sun Devils are last in the conference with an 0-5 record and are 2-11 overall.
