'Woman in Mind' replaces day to day duldrums with rich fantasy life

The third show of the Second Season at the University's Arena Theatre opens on Wednesday at 8 p.m. with the production of Woman in Mind. Woman in Mind, written by Alan Ayckbourn, is a comic farce about a middle-

The housewife, Susan, is knocked out after stepping on the tooth-end of a garden rake. From there, she begins hallucinating and replaces her dol-drums day-to-day experiences with a rich fantasy life.

Woman in Mind is being directed by John Rustan, a graduate student in the theater arts program. Rustan said the play is "hysterically funny, and at the same time it makes a very strong statement about the reality of marriage and family life as opposed to the fantasy expectations we hold for it."
