

Oregon women defeat ASU

What the Oregon women's basketball team lacked in depth Saturday night, it made up for in height.

The Duck reserves were unable to hold a 21-point second-half lead against Arizona State, but the undersized Sun Devils could not contain Oregon's post players down the stretch as Oregon rolled to a 75-59 win.

Oregon won its fourth consecutive game in the Pacific-10 Conference, the second-longest conference winning streak in school history. The Ducks improved their record to 5-2 in league play and 11-5 overall. The win also moved Oregon into a tie for second place in the Pac-10.

Arizona State, 0-7 and 2-12, was the weakest opponent Oregon had faced in almost four weeks. Oregon scored the last five points of the first half and the first nine of the second half to take a 46-27 lead with 16:29 remaining.

Oregon would extend its lead to 21 as head coach Jody Runge went to her bench. Runge said she was not conceding the game, just using an opportunity to give her starters some rest.

"We've got some bad bruises and some soft tissue, so we're trying to get them some rest," Runge said.

The Oregon reserves held their own in the first half, especially freshman forward Betty Ann Boeving, who finished with seven points and three rebounds in 14 minutes.

The second half was a different story. Oregon center Sandie Edwards scored from short range to make the score 57-40 with 10:36 left, but then the Ducks went scoreless for five minutes.

Employing a full-court press, Arizona State scored 13 unanswered points. By the time Runge returned her starters to the court, the game was too close for the comfort of many of Oregon's fans.

Runge said she "wasn't real pleased" in the bench's inability to hold the big lead but felt the reserves deserved an opportunity to prove themselves.

"We had a lot of people off the bench who got some quality minutes who haven't had those qual-

ity minutes because we've been in a learning process for so long," Runge said.

"When you have kids who haven't had much quality playing time, when they have the jitters and their feet are kind of in the mud, you have to give them time to warm up and stick with them," she said.

Arizona State drew to within four before Oregon reasserted itself. Forward Debbie Sporcich found center Sara Wilson from the high post to give Oregon a six-point lead, then Sporcich hit two foul shots on Oregon's next possession to push the Duck lead to eight at 61-53.

Arizona State had problems matching up with Wilson and Sporcich all night long. Wilson scored a game-high 19 points. Sporcich had a quiet night offensively but helped the Ducks in a variety of other ways, pulling down nine rebounds, dishing out four assists and blocking three shots.

"We knew they were going to be small inside. We just tried to look high-low as much as we could," Runge said.

Sun Devil guard Molly Tuter answered with a three-pointer to cut Oregon's lead to five with 4:36 left, but the Duck defense would allow just one point in the next 4:25. Foul shots and a pair of baskets by forward Jessica Schutt allowed Oregon to seal the victory.

Oregon outrebounded Arizona State 41-33 and held the Sun Devils to 38 percent shooting from the field. The Ducks made only three of 14 three-pointers, but shot 59 percent from inside the arc.

Schutt scored 11 points, and guard Missy Croshaw added nine points and a team-high seven assists. Guard Karen Healea had six steals for the Ducks.

"She (Runge) was telling us we weren't being aggressive enough on defense and that we were in deep crap if we didn't start doing something, so I just went after it," Healea said.

Oregon travels to the Bay Area for games against Stanford on Thursday and California on Saturday. The Cardinal, 4-2 and 11-4 going into Sunday's contest against USC, was ranked among the top 25 nationally in last week's coaches' poll.

Oregon's next home game is Feb. 11, against Oregon State.

Cal men upset UCLA

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) — Jason Kidd took over the game, and once again a new team will take over the No. 1 ranking.

Kidd had 18 points, a career-high 14 rebounds and 12 assists Sunday, leading California to an 85-70 upset of UCLA, which ensured itself of becoming the latest top-ranked team to have a short stay in that spot.

The Bruins (14-1, 7-1 Pac-10), who were the last undefeated team in Division I, never led during the game and shot just 38 percent. They moved into the No. 1 spot last week, then barely beat Stanford, 69-65 Thursday night.

Kidd stepped up after George Zidek's free throw

with 4:41 left pulled UCLA to 70-68. He fed a pass to Ryan Jamison for a layup, then proceeded to score nine of the last 11 points for the Golden Bears (12-4, 5-2). He added a steal and a defensive rebound in the waning minutes.

The pace, which Kidd established from the start, was fast and the play physical. But Cal's switch to a zone defense forced the Bruins to go outside, where they were 1-for-19 from 3-point range.

"It's hard to swallow," said forward Ed O'Bannon, whose 24 points led the Bruins. "We were used to winning. But I think we're good enough and confident enough to bounce back."

USC women beat Stanford

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Lisa Leslie scored a career-high 34 points to become the Pacific-10's women's career scoring leader, and No. 8 Southern Cal defeated 10th-ranked Stanford 81-73 Sunday.

Leslie bettered the record of 2,077 by former Stanford player Val Whiting with seven points during USC's 17-2 game-opening run. She now has 2,104 points.

Leslie added 11 rebounds, three blocked shots and two assists for the Trojans (15-1, 8-0 Pac-10).

"Lisa Leslie showed why

she is the best player out there," USC coach Cheryl Miller said. "She was tremendous. I told her before the game, 'Just go out there and have fun.'"

USC led 38-36 at halftime, but trailed 57-51 with 11:28 remaining. Leslie hit a layup to give the Trojans the lead for good, 61-59. The basket launched a 10-2 spurt capped by another Leslie basket as USC led 71-61 with four minutes to play. She converted four free throws in the final 11 minutes to hold off the Cardinal (11-5, 4-3).
