
Another protest

Ceremony honors employees of EMU

About 60 people attended the EMU Employee Recognition Ceremony at the Gerlinger Alumni Lounge Tuesday to honor outstanding EMU employees.

Gayle Johnson was thanked for 25 years of service at the payroll office. Alan Boslaugh (custody), Tom Urban (Craft Center), Linda Ednoff (Outdoor Program) and Sandy Vaughn (Club Sports) celebrated the twentieth year of dedication to their work.

When people ask, What do these 20 years mean to you?' I answer that when I first came, students could have dated me.' Vaughn said. "Now I could be their mother!"

Also honored were Barbara Griffin, Peter Mayer and Alicia Mocassin for 10 years of service. Frank Gosar, Jennie Barela, Jacqueline Gibson, Kathy Cooks, Mary Caspell and Dennis Carr were recognized for five years.

Cooks appreciated having her work recognized. "It's been a long time," she said.

Rape charges dismissed

A Lane County Circuit Court judge has dismissed first-degree rape charges against a University graduate physics student.

The student, 32-year-old Young-Tak Chough, charged Dec. 1, 1993, of raping a female acquaintance Nov. 6 at the Westmoreland family housing complex.

Chough entered a plea of not guilty Dec. 3, and the charge was dismissed "in the interest of justice" Jan. 18. The district attorney in charge of the case was unavailable for comment.
