



Success over the airwaves

How does a Monday, Wednesday, Friday class become a halfhour long television newscast? That's exactly what Jim Upshaw's Advanced Television

News class is learning. Upshaw

spent 22 years in the television news business, working mostly with NBC. Last year when

During his first quarter at the University, Upshaw decided to really teach his students about the television news business by changing the class format from taped news broadcasts to live news broadcasts.

As demonstrated by the first two UO News broadcasts, Upshaw's format has been very successful, but success on the air is not the main objective of the class.



"It's about finding out who you are," Upshaw said. "Is this right for you? Is it pulling you where you want to go?"

Many of Upshaw's spring and winter graduates have answered "yes" to these questions and are already working in the business.

"We have at least one student interning at all three of the networks in town," he said. Others are working for

and various television stations and video firms around the nation.

The road to these opportuni-

ties is paved with hard work and more hard work. "It's really about time management," Upshaw said.

Students must first complete Journalism 331, Radio and Television News I, and Journalism 432, Reporting for the Electronic Media, before they are allowed to take the actual broadcast class. In those classes they learn the very basics of writing for television news, editing and how the equipment works.

Actual class periods are used to brainstorm ideas and make assignments for the following Friday's broadcast.
