'Woman in Mind' remarkable

The cast of Woman In Mind, which began its run at the Arena Theatre Wednesday night, was overwhelmed by opening-night jitters

It's an ambitious production by the cast, Director John Rustan and even the playwright, Alan Ayckbourn. The story is about an English housewife who has hit her head with a garden rake.

The accident makes Susan, played by Janet Gup-

ton, queasy, and her mental state begins to deteriorate. Woman In Mind is a dark comedy. The cast is challenged to use English accents and mannerisms true to their characters.

Bill, played by Dave Sikula, is profuse at grasping the language and nuances of his character. He has come to check on Susan after the accident. He delivers some of the funniest lines of the play about animals and people in a dry, unbeknown way

Janet Gupton acts her part well but here is where nervousness clearly caused her to run over some of Sikula's lines. Susan hallucinates and imagines a perfect family for herself. They're rich, beautiful, loving and everything she could ever hope for.

The costumes designed by Deanna Sorenson are a balance of bright, light, clean colors associated with the family. Sorenson juxtaposes that with the drab and dreary tones of Susan's actual family.

Gerald, Susan's husband, played by Kevin Trudeau, is a minister who has been working on a 60-page history of their parish since 1395. To Susan, it feels as though he's been working on the book since 1395. Trudeau plays Gerald prudish, unfeeling in as keenly a manner as possible.

The actors stand out with their own unique takes. it's just that the large comic elements necessary to move Woman In Mind forward makes it difficult to believe the actors were actually settled into their

Eric Lammerman, who plays Andy, the world's most wonderful husband, comes across quite strong in the first act. By the second half of the play, he's not nearly as believable by having to project a good guy/bad guy image.

Vivaldi's "Four Seasons" sets the pace as Susan's madness becomes more pronounced. The play's setting is a small, outdoor garden with brick prints along the walk, English ivy and concrete benches during a two-day period.

Lighting designers Theresa Mason and David Hess have created believable effects, bringing out the ambiance of a sunset. Their ability to present the impact of a thunderstorm and finally the strobe of an ambulance light is quick, but captivating.

The montage of insanity as Susan begins to slip away from the reality of her world is striking. The maniacal, intense activity on stage is symbolic of Susan's mind falling apart. This climax was a remarkable accomplishment to portray
