## Neighborhood plants trees donated by city

Some members of the South University neighborhood had never met each other until Saturday.

And the chore of planting more than 50 trees along Alder Street gave these neighbors ample opportunities to meet one another, to share gardening tips and to plan other gatherings while beautifying the neighborhood.

"It's really hard to get to know your neighbors," said Nance Emmett, an Alder Street resident. "Anything that gets neighbors together is a good thing."

About 30 neighborhood residents and fraternity members wielded shovels early Saturday to plant 52 trees donated by the city of Eugene. The city is offering about 1,000 free trees to Eugene residents through its Neighborhoods program. Last year, the city helped volunteers plant 600 trees.

Jan Staszewski, the city's urban forester, said trees are free to any volunteers who will plant them along city right-of-ways. Trees have to meet certain guidelines and site constraints, such as not interfering with utility lines.

Organized three years ago, the tree-planting program helps people determine what trees would best survive in their neighborhood. The city provides the trees, informational packets to help neighbors care for trees and tools for planting trees. Staszewski assists at tree plantings.

Allen Hancock, a former University student, organized the

Alder Street tree planting Saturday and helped his neighbors determine what species of trees to plant. About 30 different tree species, ranging from a black locust to an elderberry, were planted.

"We tried to get a diversity of trees that would do well in this area," Hancock said.

Hancock attended a two-hour Neighborhoods workshop and relied on information he learned from University classes to help plan the project. He contacted his neighbors and Delta Upsilon, a nearby fraternity. Fraternity members dug all the holes needed to plant the trees.

"It's nice to be able to give something back to the community," fraternity member Steven Asbury said. "It helps improve how the community perceives greets, especially here on campus."

Staszewski said the city prefers to donate trees to groups of people and neighborhoods rather than to individuals.

"You develop a neighborhood and community spirit," he said. "A lot of neighborhoods don't even see each other until they plant trees."

Members of the Alder Street neighborhood will now remove about 12 diseased trees and are responsible for caring for the new trees. Hancock said he hopes Saturday's project will set a positive example for the rest of the University neighborhoods.

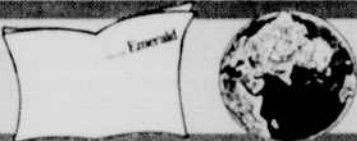
"This was pretty much something new for us," he said. "I was hoping this might be a catalyst for other projects."

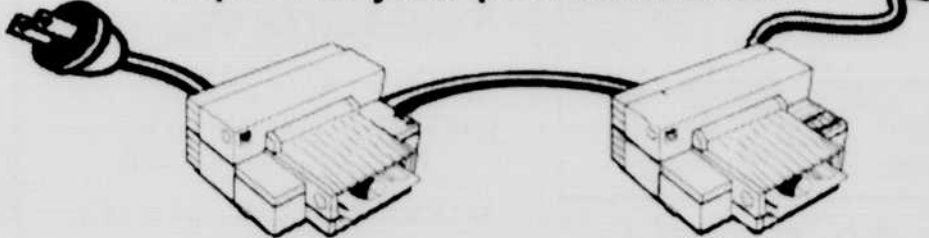
