fell to 6-7 in the Pac-10 and 16-9 overall, came into the game clinging to hopes for a possible NCAA Tournament invitation, but a loss to the Ducks won't look good on the power ratings, especially considering that the game was in Pullman.

The loss to Oregon may have relegated the Cougars to NIT shoo-ins rather than NCAA hopefuls.

The Ducks led for much of the first half and went into the locker room at halftime with a 44-35 lead. Behind Williams' three-

pointers, Oregon built the lead to as much as 20 early in the second half.

The Ducks led 69-50 with 10:24 remaining when Washington State put together an 18-7 spurt to make the score 76-68 with six minutes left in the game.

The Cougars continued to rally and eventually cut the Oregon lead to three points on Eddie Hill's three-pointer with 4:29 remaining. Still ahead by only three points, Williams sealed the game for the Ducks when he was fouled on a three-point attempt and hit all three free throws to put Oregon up 84-78. The Cougars never got any closer.

Besides Williams' magnificent performance, Darryl Parker added 16, and Kenya Wilkins scored 12 points and had five assists.

For Washington State, five players — Fred Ferguson, Tony Harris, Hill, Nathan Erdmann and Isaac Fontaine — scored in double figures. The Cougars shot 43 percent from the field and were outrebounded by the Ducks, 40-32.

Oregon's next game will be Thursday when the Ducks host Arizona State at McArthur Court, followed by a Saturday game with Arizona.

ally a small forward, to front the post player.

If the opposition is able to lob the ball over the smaller player and into the post, the offensive player faces 6-foot-3 center Sara Wilson or 6-foot-4 forward Debbie Sporcich, who deliver help from the weak side.

"The first thing is keeping the ball out of there. If they get they do get over the defender, the help person is still big. There's not a little guard down there helping," Oregon head coach Jody Runge said. "The best way to defend a good post is to not

let them touch the ball."

Oregon also has made opposing post players work on defense. Wilson did most of the damage in the paint for Oregon on Saturday, scoring 18 points and grabbing 11 rebounds. Forward Debbie Sporcich and forward Arianne Boyer, who started to allow Jessica Schutt to rest a nagging leg injury, combined for 16 points and 12 rebounds.

"For Deb, Arianne and myself, it's a goal of ours to keep them (the opposition's post players) out of their game and try to do everything we can to put the pressure on them and to not allow them to get the points that

they want," Wilson said.

Oregon looked relaxed from the opening tip but hurt itself with unforced mistakes and lapses in intensity in the first half. Oregon led by eight at halftime before a 13-2 run in the early stages of the second half extended the Ducks' lead to 51-34 with 12:19 remaining.

Washington State never got closer than 14 points the rest of the way. After Thompson fouled out with the score 62-48, the Cougars floundered. Oregon scored 10 straight points to increase its lead to 24 points and seal the victory.

Guard Missy Croshaw led Oregon in scoring with 20 points.

Wrestlers fall to OSU; Duck softball gets win

The Oregon wrestling team stayed close to Oregon State, but the ninth-ranked Beavers came on strong late to defeat the Ducks 20-12 at McArthur Court on Friday night.

Oregon State's Les Gutches and Chad Renner, ranked No. 1 and No. 2 in the country at 177 and 167 pounds, respectively, broke open a tight match with victories over their Oregon opponents.

With Oregon State leading 11-9 after six matches, Renner defeated Oregon's Tom Glenn 6-3. Gutches was up next, and he beat Mat Sprague 10-3 to give the Beavers a 17-9 lead.

The Oregon softball team fell to No. 9 UNLV before defeating Illinois State Saturday during its season-opening tournament in Phoenix, Ariz.

UNLV jumped on the Ducks early when Kim Rondina hit a

two-run homer in the first inning. Oregon tied the game 2-2 in the second inning, but UNLV responded with two more runs in the second inning and held on to win 4-2.

The Ducks evened their record at 2-2 when they defeated Illinois State 4-3, in the afternoon. Heather Holte had a home run in the sixth inning and drove in the game-winning run during the eighth inning to lead the Ducks to the win.

Oregon junior Ted Snavely fired an opening-round 72 to lead a balanced Oregon attack as the men's golf team moved into an eighth place tie at the Big Island Intercollegiate in Waikoloa, Hawaii.

Oregon's Paul Regali shot a 1-over-par 73, while Andy Scheidt and Joel Stock followed with a 74 and a 76, respectively, to move the Ducks into a tie with Nihon (Japan) at 295.

Did You Know?

Prior to this weekend, 1987 was the last time the Oregon men's and women's basketball teams swept Pacific-10 Conference opponents on the same weekend. On Jan. 29 and Feb. 1, 1987, the Oregon men swept California and Stanford at home, while the women went on the road to beat the two Bay Area schools on Jan. 30 and 31.
