"It's all contingent upon the rent," he said. "We won't need insurance if we don't have to pay the rent."

Originally the *Commentator* had to pay rent to the EMU because it was receiving private funds, but now it relies mainly on student funds, Bowen said.

Because the *Commentator* is now run more like a student program, it could go before the EMU Board of Directors and request to be free from the rent payments.

Frank Geltner, associate director of the EMU, said he doesn't know if the *Commentator* will be able to go rent free. The EMU does have a rental policy, but it makes no reference to the word "incorporated," which the *Commentator* is.

"The absence of the word makes it confusing," he said. "If it was just a student program, I would have no problem with (free rent). But the incorporation is a problem."

On the issue of the *Commentator's* \$10 corporate fee, Bowen said it is inappropriate for incidental fees to pay for the *Commentator's* status as a corporation.

When it came to the insurance increase, Bowen said he believed the *Commentator* was asking for twice as much as it needed because incidental fees

already pay insurance for all ASUO-funded programs.

Brennan Rounds said it was irresponsible of Bowen to wait until after the *Commentator's* hearing to say anything about the budget.

"He (vetoed) without talking with us or the IFC," he said.

Brennan Rounds said he wanted to know why Bowen vetoed the budget instead of expressing his concerns about it before the *Commentator's* budget hearing.

"He waited until the last minute to veto," he said. "We could have saved the IFC another hearing."

Bowen said the reason he did not say anything about the budget earlier was because of information that was presented to him by IFC members after the budget hearing.

The IFC has not yet determined when the *Commentator's* next budget hearing will be.

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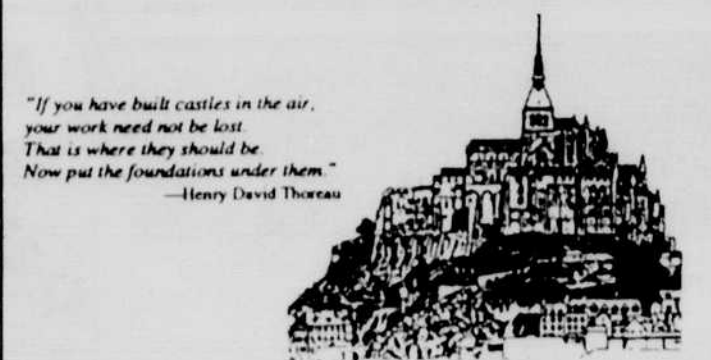
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
