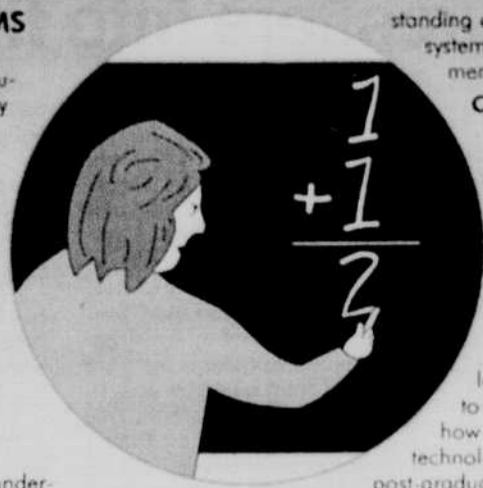

The educational and social systems specialization will provide students with an understanding of social and educational systems. It will also prepare students to work with a wide variety of cultural, racial, linguistic and other social settings. Career opportunities for graduates include employment in various non-profit and public agencies, such as the Children's Services Division, corrections, State Employment Division, Planned Parenthood, welfare agencies and substance abuse facilities.

The integrated licensure specialization will teach students to meet the educational needs of all children, regardless of their abilities. Students in the program will be taught how to teach

with technology and how to adapt teaching methods and curriculum to meet the needs of a full range of learners in a classroom.

Kaufman said that students who obtain a degree in educational studies will have a competitive advantage for employment opportunities, as they will have up-to-date skills in a field that has expanded in the past five years. Instead of being limited to a classroom position, educators today are needed in human service systems and in business and technology companies to help with staff development, for example.

"There's clearly a market need for this program," Kaufman said.

Undergraduate majors in elementary and secondary education were cut from the University in 1991 because of budget cuts from the passage of

Measure 5, a property tax limitation measure. Despite the cuts, the college still offers graduate training programs in such areas as special education, developmental disabilities, school psychology, school administration, and communication disorders and sciences.

The program will be supported out of current College of Education resources, and college officials have estimated that the program will generate revenue because about 30 students will be accepted into each of the three specializations every year.

The program will be staffed by college faculty and other teachers from local school districts. There is a tremendous interest among University faculty to teach classes for the educational studies major, as many current faculty were involved in the college's education program before the Measure 5 cuts, Kaufman said.
