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Police arrest man for bad checks

LEBANON, Ind. (AP) — A fugitive wanted in five states for allegedly passing more than \$500,000 in bad checks was denied a public defender Monday because he can afford to hire a private attorney, a judge ruled.

Floyd L. Burton, 52, of Oregon, was arrested Friday at the Countryside Antique Mall northwest of Lebanon, authorities said. Bond is set at \$500,000.

Jack Schoettle, a transport officer for the Boone County Sheriff's department, said Burton appeared for an initial hearing Monday and was denied a public defender. Another hear-

ing was set for May 6 on a misdemeanor check deception charge.

Police say Burton passed more than \$3,000 in bad checks to several antique stores in the Nappanee area earlier this month. He was arrested by sheriff's deputies when he attempted to purchase an antique oak table and glassware with a bogus \$918 check.

Authorities say Burton attempted to buy the antiques with a check written on an alias name, Gerald R. Helmer of Grants Pass, Ore.

A clerk at the antique store had just finished reading an arti-

cle in *Antique Week* submitted by a worker at the Nappanee Antique Mall, and called sheriff's officials. The article described Helmer and detailed how he allegedly wrote bad checks.

Police say an investigation revealed Burton has allegedly used more than 17 fake names and is accused of passing more than \$500,000 in bad checks in Oregon alone. He is wanted on arrest warrants in California, Oregon, Iowa, New York and Indiana.

Schoettle said authorities do not know Burton's exact hometown.

Woman on a mission recalls assassination

FEDERAL WAY, Wash. (AP) — A Federal Way woman who was visiting Mexico on a humanitarian mission when the country's leading presidential candidate was assassinated says she's glad to be back home.

Susana Anibarro had been in Chiapas, Mexico's poorest state and the site of a rebellion in January, since mid-March as a delegate from the Tacoma-based Christian Committee in Solidarity with the People of Latin America.

Her job was to meet with human-rights organizations and Bishop Carlos Ruiz, a Catholic priest whom the Mexican rebels — known as the Zapatistas — had chosen to mediate talks with the Mexican government.

Anibarro recalls the day last week when she found out PRI candidate Luis Donaldo Colosio had been shot in Tijuana.

"We were coming down a very dark street in San Cristobal," said Anibarro. "All of a sudden I saw these white flags being raised on the houses and people were walking toward the city walls."

"Immediately you could feel the tension."

Back at the hotel a priest told her group what had happened. The murder occurred at a time when Colosio was focusing his campaign on the need to bring full democracy to Mexico.

"It was scary for me," said Anibarro, who returned home two days after Wednesday's assassination. "I wanted to get out."

Anibarro's group decided to leave Mexico quickly, but first stopped in Mexico City.

"The people were in mourning," she said. "It was a sense of disbelief that that could be happening."

Porn trial moved to Yakima

SPOKANE (AP) — The trial of a Davenport teacher accused of sexually exploiting students in a pornography scheme will be heard in Yakima because of too much publicity in Spokane, a judge has ruled.

In an order released Monday, U.S. District Judge Justin Quackenbush set a May 23 trial for Charles L. Jungblom in Yakima.

Quackenbush ruled that extensive coverage of the case by Spokane media "would make selection of a fair and impartial jury ... extremely difficult, if not impossible" in this city.

Jungblom, 53, is charged with two counts of sexual exploitation of minors.
