- A new EMU Gallery exhibition will begin Saturday. Photographic innovator Todd Walker's hand-printed books and photolithographs will be on display until April 29.

- The University Humanities Center and the Medieval Studies Program will sponsor a conference about life at the fringe of medieval society next week. From April 7-9 panels will discuss law, literature, religion and the position of women in medieval society. They will also discuss how medieval society has influenced contemporary culture.

- A Native American rights

activist and legal spokesman will speak and lecture during a two-week visit to Eugene that starts April 4. John Echohawk will speak about native issues and the media April 7 at 3 p.m. in Room 123 Pacific. On April 12 Echohawk will lecture about current trends in tribal law at 7:30 p.m. in Souza Hall at the Eugene Conference Center. On April 8, he will participate in a constitutional law class and discuss the legal aspects of peyote use in religious rites.

Eligible candidates must be either an undergraduate student at the University enrolled for a minimum of six credit hours per term in three of the four academic quarters of his or her term as Editor, or a graduate student at the University enrolled for a minimum of three credit hours per term in three of the four academic quarters of his or her term as Editor. All applicants must be in good academic standing. Prior newsroom experience required.

The *Oregon Daily Emerald* is published by a non-profit corporation which operates independently of the University. The primary purpose of the ODE is to provide education and training for students in all aspects of newspaper operation by serving a campus audience with news, editorial and advertising content.

The Editor of the ODE, who reports to a 10-person volunteer Board of Directors, has responsibility for all editorial operations and all editorial content of the newspaper. Term of office is June 7, 1994 through the last issue of Spring term, 1995, and is preceded by an orientation period which begins no later than May 2 and extends through June 6. This is a paid position.
