

IFC grants increase for KWVA

KWVA, the campus radio station, was allocated a budget of \$48,450 for the 1994-95 academic year. This is a 35.9 percent increase from the budget allocated by the IFC for the 1993-94 year, but it is only a 1.8 percent increase in KWVA's operational budget for the 1993-94 year.

KWVA went before the IFC last year in the form of a special request to receive the money that it had failed to spend from its budget allocation two years ago. KWVA was granted \$11,920 which rolled over into its current operational account.

Representatives of KWVA said they were happy with the budget increase, despite the fact that they had requested a higher budget.

KWVA was allocated a large increase in the area of promotion. Representatives J. Pierson and John Thomas stressed the importance of being able to promote the radio station to the community. KWVA has been on the air since May 28, 1993.

Thomas said, "KWVA is really a business, it takes money to make money." He stressed the importance of flooding KWVA with the financial support which will allow it to meet the goal of

being self sufficient in five years.

KWVA also received an increase in funding for equipment. Pierson said that the station is currently operating with home deck CD players which are not designed for constant 24 hour a day radio use.

As a result of not owning equipment made for a radio station, KWVA has been purchasing a new CD player every 2 months. With the increase in student funds allocated for equipment costs the station will be able to purchase a CD player designed for radio use.

"We are still lacking a great deal of equipment at this time," said Pierson.

KWVA requested \$5,250 to purchase new music next year but was only allocated \$3,500. Pierson said that the problem of not being able to fulfill student requests will still exist. He said that the station is currently turning away requests every night.

KWVA's budget was passed with a 3-1-0 vote. IFC Chairman Jian Liu was the only member of the committee present who did not vote in favor of the budget. Liu said, "This is not a time of year for us to support a lot of improvements."
