Grateful Dead may play Autzen

EUGENE (AP) — The Grateful Dead could be coming back to Autzen Stadium this summer for the longest stint the band has ever played at the University.

A tentative agreement has been reached for three days of back-to-back concerts on June 17, 18 and 19. Following a three-year hiatus, the band last year entertained its cult following at Autzen for two days.

Although University officials hesitate to spell out the final points of the deal, they confirm that the new contract would expand camping facilities, untangle traffic routes, and increase bus service and bike parking.

As always, the band's promoters would pay for off-duty Eugene police officers to handle traffic

and security concerns — an expense of more than \$50,000 that won't land on city taxpayers.

Contacted Monday night at a concert in Orlando, Fla., Grateful Dead publicist Dennis McNally said information about the Eugene performances was released on the band's ticket information hotline Monday afternoon.

"What I'm hearing is 'yes, it's a go,'" said McNally, who added that an opening act still hasn't been selected.

Tickets for each show will be \$28.50 general admission.

Last August, a two-day Grateful Dead concert drew an estimated 86,000 fans to Autzen Stadium.

The 1993 concerts raised about \$275,000 for the athletic department before taxes.

Trucks sit idle as Teamsters join strike

PORTLAND (AP) — Trucks loaded with toilet paper, hardware, textiles and other goods sat idle in Oregon Wednesday as 1,850 Teamsters members joined a national strike.

Scores of trucks were parked at a Consolidated Freightways Corp. terminal in Portland, where a dozen men stood in the cold spring rain, carrying union-printed picket signs and crowding around a fire barrel to keep warm.

Teamsters member Bob Jett said the goods aren't likely to be moved, even if independent drivers are hired.

"If they can get through the line," he said, "I wouldn't put myself in that danger, would you?"

A Teamsters local representing warehouse workers who are not on strike delivered urns of

coffee and boxes of doughnuts. Passing cars and trucks honked and waved to show their support.

Picket lines also were set up Wednesday at terminals in Eugene, Medford, Salem, Ontario and Madras for Consolidated Freightways, Yellow Freight Systems Inc., ABF Freight System Inc. and Roadway Express Inc.

The national walkout by up to 75,000 union members began at midnight over a plan by the companies to give more work to part-time workers and use trains more often.

"They want to take our jobs away," said Teamsters member Doug Linton in Portland.

"A part-time worker could not support a family," said Bruno Bridges, business representative for Teamsters Local 181, as he met with strikers at a Yellow Freight Systems terminal. "All he could do is take jobs away from union members."

At the 24-acre Jubitz Truck Stop along Interstate 5, some independent truckers said they did not expect the strike to affect them.

Others, however, said when big companies lower their costs, independents must do the same to stay competitive.

"The big fish are getting out of control," said Kevin, who did not want his last name used. "It's killing the industry."
