myself because of the responsibility to students," IFC Chairman Jian Liu said, in regards to the fiscal increase.

Rodgers said that the Women's Center budget request asks for six dollars per student on campus next year, to be collected from incidental fees. In an analogy attempting to put perspective on the issue, she said it was the price of six burritos per student from Taco Time.

IFC member Caitlin Twain recognized the dissonance among the committee. She said, "In a lot of ways I feel that your budget would be better off going to the ballot." However, the motion to send the budget request to students failed.

The largest restructuring change of the Women's Center budget is in administration. The budget request eliminates the current position of an administrative adviser and replaces it with a director. Rodgers said that a director will have more authority than an adviser, whose duty is simply to advise rather than delegate authority.

The Women's Center Restructuring Committee intends to initiate a nationwide search for a professional and experienced director. Rodgers

expressed concern about the success of finding such a director when funding has yet to be secured.

Other increases include the creation of several paid student positions in the office. Restructuring representative Rain Sussman said, "We really wanted to create positions for students that would give them more leadership opportunities."

Twain suggested that these student positions could be offered to students for credit through Women's Studies or ESCAPE.

Women's Center representatives expressed concern about the retention of students from term to term.

The Restructuring Committee also hopes to be granted funds which can be used for general support groups, one example would be a support group for women of color.

The Women's Center is requesting student fees to provide child care for its events which often take place in the evening. Sussman said that some women are not able to participate in events on campus because there are no facilities for child care available to them in the evenings.

"I see this as a survival center for women on campus. I don't think this is an inappropriate request," Rodgers said.

"What you get is a migration following the band," Kesey said. "You won't get the stick-around this year."

Tickets for the shows will be \$28.50 and can be bought at Ticketmaster or through the Grateful Dead hotline, (415) 457-6388. Camping and day parking will be available at Autzen Sta-

dium for an additional price, Walton said.

Kesey said the band likes to tour Eugene because many band members have extended families living in the area and the relationship his family has established with the band. Kesey's parents, Chuck and Sue Kesey, organized the Dead's first local concert in Veneta.

"There's a relationship between the band and my fami-

ly that's ongoing," Kesey said.

Although Kesey said it would be ideal to plan the concert somewhere in the wilderness, but Autzen Stadium is the most feasible location. And, the concert brings a lot of revenue to the Eugene economy, he said. Last year the concert generated about \$3.5 million dollars in revenue.

"All of the motels from Salem to Klamath Falls were completely booked," Kesey said.
