Groups fight against sexual crimes

The Unwanted Sexual Behavior Task Force is networking with other groups on campus to stop sexual assault and rapes. The task force was established in response from students and parents who were concerned about their safety or their child's well-being.

Their goal is to build a solid foundation so that students will have a safe place. They will be able to get all the help necessary through the various groups involved such as, Creating a Rape Free Environment, Saferide and Greeks Against Rape.

Since their current focus is to get more students to report sexual assaults and rapes, the actual number of sexual crimes remains vague. If the numbers continue to be unclear, the University will be unable to obtain a clear indication of how severe the problem of sexual assault is on campus.

"It's really hard to say where the University is at in terms of numbers, because many students don't report any sexual assaults," said Jason Ashley, assistant dean of students.

The task force urges students to report any sexual crimes with the University Office of Public Safety and Eugene Police Department. Students can also fill out an unofficial report form that doesn't require the student to state their name or identification.

These forms are located in various buildings throughout campus such as the EMU and Prince Lucien Campbell Hall. Although these forms have been available in the past, students have still neglected to fill them out.

"I don't know that the numbers have increased because no unofficial report forms have been returned. Students don't want to fill out the forms. Some are embarrassed or ashamed of the assault," said Shio Shigeoka, a staff member at the dean of students.

The task force will continue to educate and raise awareness of this issue. In the past, it has printed brochures and pamphlets regarding sexually assaults and rapes and has even produced a videotape at the University geared toward international students and cultural misconceptions and stereotypes.

Currently, the task force is forming a committee to promote the task force to the student body. Also, it encourages students to attend informational meetings the first and third Wednesday of every month in the EMU.

Next month, the task force will begin "Training of Trainers" informational meetings. These meetings will cover all aspects and issues dealing with sexual assault and rape. In the fall, students will be trained on how to educate other students concerning these issues.

"It seems that students learn more and take issues more serious when they're taught by a peer rather than an instructor or someone who's much older than them," Shigeoka said.

The task force urges that all students should at least be aware that sexual assault and rape is a universal issue.

"I was brought up by my mother, and I have a sister. I need to be aware. I have female friends who could open up to me about sexual harassed. I want men to know that it isn't only a women's issue," Ashley said.
