

Duck men overcome weather to win meet

The Oregon men's track team overcame rain, wind and cold to set 10 personal records in a 135-60 rout of Navy on Saturday at Hayward Field.

Oregon won 17 of 19 events in the meet. The Ducks relied on depth to accumulate points in the field events early in the meet, then won some competitive races to close out the day.

Cool, windy conditions and sporadic rain may have hampered chances for outstanding marks, but the weather didn't prevent some Oregon athletes from improving upon their previous bests.

The Ducks opened the day with Oregon athletes finishing 1-2 in the first three events. Dan Zorich and Jeremy Robinson took the top two spots in the hammer. Ray Livingston and Ryan Mayes finished 1-2 in the long jump, and Jeremy Williams and Livingston were the top finishers in the pole vault.

Stan Duplaga gave Navy a victory in the javelin, but Oregon's Dusty Carlson and Zorich placed first and second in the shot put and Eric White and Chris Nelson of Oregon took the

top two spots in the high jump.

The meet didn't get much better for Navy when the two teams took to the track. Oregon's Scott Nicholas shaved 2.5 seconds off his personal record and won the 3,000-meter steeplechase by 13 seconds.

Oregon won the 4x100-meter relay next, then saw a pair of Oregon athletes set PRs in the 1,500 meters. Karl Keska and Benjamin Andrews each knocked about four seconds off their previous bests in finishing first and second in the event.

Livingston's win in the 110-meter hurdles was his second victory of the day. Livingston got support from Sol Sallos, who set a PR and finished .05 seconds behind Livingston.

Patrick Khoo won the 400 meters for Oregon, then LaMont Woods and DeWayne Ingram finished 1-2 for the Ducks in the 100. In the 800, Gordon Johnson charged from the back of the pack and won by almost two seconds.

Zorich and Carlson closed out Oregon's scoring in the throws by taking the top two spots in

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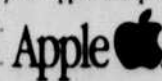
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
