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Men set record

The Oregon men's tennis team, plagued by multiple injuries, made some unorthodox roster changes that resulted in four victories and a school record last weekend.

The four wins raised the team's season total to 21-9, breaking the old record of 20 victories in a season, set in 1981.

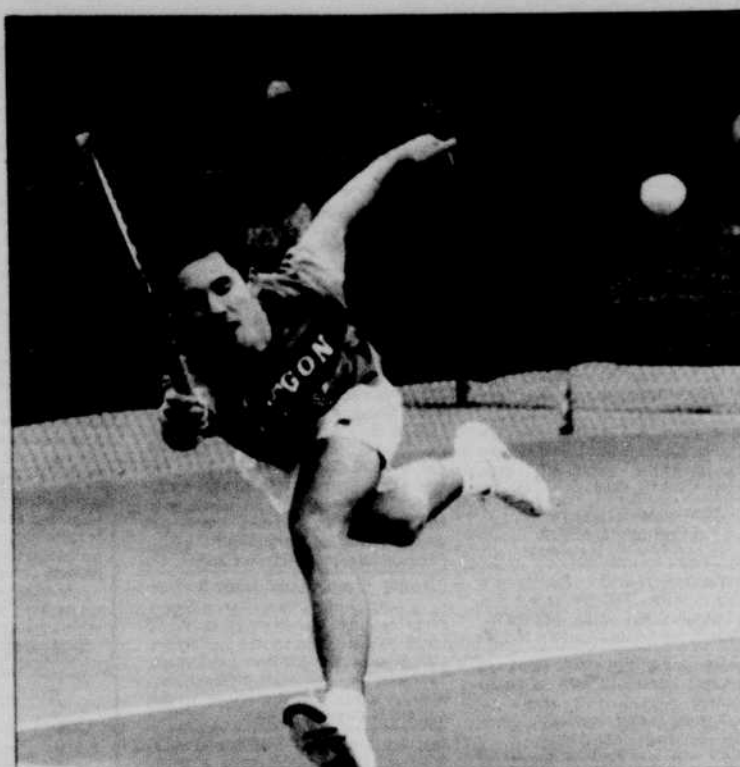
Saturday, the Ducks defeated Willamette 4-3, and handed Pacific Lutheran its first loss of the season with a 7-0 sweep.

The Ducks were at home on Sunday for another full day of matches beginning with Lewis and Clark in the morning. Dara Partovi and Mike Goldstein turned in impressive performances as did senior Lee Kirner who won a tough three-set match. In the afternoon, the Ducks cruised past Puget Sound 9-0 for their record-breaking 21st win.

The atmosphere as the afternoon contest ended was one of relief for the team.

"This weekend was grueling," co-captain Kirner said. "We have a lot of guys out with injuries, so we had to do double-duty for these matches."

Four players are currently injured for the Ducks. Junior Aaron D'Amico has had his season cut short by a broken hand. Josh Prager, Christian Oelke and Luke Rencher are out indefinitely.

Kirner says the focus of the team is to defeat their in-state rival, Portland, on Tuesday and then gear up for the tournament. The matches on Tuesday and the tournament this weekend will be played at Oregon's 15th Street Courts.

The Ducks were impressive in a three-match sweep of Puget Sound, Eastern Washington and Lewis and Clark, winning each contest 9-0.

"It was nice to see our team play well," Greider said. "Nobody really seemed to struggle."

This past weekend was very special for the women's team. The Lewis and Clark match on Sunday was the final home match for the four graduating seniors on the team: co-captains Sherry Fairgrieve and Jackie DeFord, along with Krissy Barger and Cynthia Armstrong. The underclassmen presented their graduating teammates with flowers prior to the match.

"(Sunday) was a good day for our seniors," Greider said. "The team got a strong win and they got a nice send-off."

Greider also received an honor this weekend. The Ducks' win over Eastern Washington on Sat-

urday gave him his 100th career coaching victory. Greider's record now stands at 101-41-1, and of those 101 wins, only 36 have been at home while 62 have been against Division I opponents. Greider said he was very satisfied with the milestone, attributing most of it to his players over the past six years.

"I've coached some great fighters over the years," he said. "Of course, I couldn't have reached this goal without them."

The women will use this next week to rest up and prepare for Pacific-10 Conference regional dual meets in Seattle next weekend.

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
