Hickson got help in the field two batters later when Dina Frandsen grounded to shortstop Kathy Stahl, who bobbled the ball before throwing hard to first baseman Rose Imbriano to barely get Frandsen.

The next batter, Karen Bonini, walked to load the bases for centerfielder Erika Perez. Hickson worked the count to 3-2 before Perez hit a light ground ball to third baseman Trina Salcido, who threw her out. If things had gone differently for Perez, Hickson may never have gotten her chance to pitch the complete game.

"We had Rachel warming up," Brown said. "It depend-

ed on that next hitter. Barbie really fights and she went after that next hitter, but if there had been trouble I may have brought Rachel in."

Hickson only hit a few other rough spots and fought through each of them until extra innings. After nine innings, the game went to the International tie-breaker rule where each team begins the inning with a runner on second base.

Cal put Bonini on second, and she scored on a two-out double by Laura Terada. Hickson intentionally walked catcher Gillian Boxx to bring up Seymore, who delivered an RBI single, giving the Bears a 2-0 lead heading into the bottom of the tenth inning.

The win should move the Ducks up in the rankings and give them momentum and confidence as they await the arrival of Arizona State and Arizona in their next Pac-10 game in two weeks.

Duck men take second at Pac-10s

Washington went undefeated in all 40 matches at the men's Pacific-10 Conference Northern Division Championships to capture its 19th straight Northern Division title this weekend.

Oregon finished second in the tournament with 17 points and second in the Northern Division with 22 points. Washington State, which is dropping its men's tennis program next year, ended the tournament with three points and accumulated six in the division.

"We look good for the future," Oregon head coach Buzz Summers said. "With the freshmen we've got, our team has some good vibes going."

Oregon's Dana Partovi collected his 20th win Sunday against Matt Dickson of Washington State, placing him atop the list for single-season victories. The junior from Lake Oswego beat Oregon women's coach Tom Grieder's record of 19-7 set in 1980. Partovi is 20-7 this year.

The Ducks now prepare themselves for postseason play. Oregon will take six players to Ojai, Calif., for the Intercollegiate Invitational Championships, April 21-24. Oregon senior Lee Kirner qualified to play in the Pac-10's Southern Division Championships next weekend in Ojai as well.

Meanwhile, the Oregon women's tennis team finished its season at 14-8-1 after losing to Washington State Saturday.

The loss against the Cougars combined with Fri-

day's 0-9 defeat against Washington put Oregon in third place in the Northern Division.

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The Oregon men's golf team finished in a 12th-place tie among a tough field at the Thunderbird ASU Intercollegiate Saturday.

Ten of the 11 teams that finished ahead of Oregon are ranked in the Top 20, including six of the top seven teams in the country. The Ducks shot 885, tying them with USC and putting them ahead of Pacific-10 Conference rival UCLA.

Arizona State's No. 1 team won the tournament at 841, 15 shots ahead of No. 7 Texas. ASU's Larry Barber, who won the Duck Invitational earlier this year, won the individual title at 205.

Ted Snaveley once again led the way for Oregon, finishing tied for 22nd place at 218. Snaveley opened the tournament with rounds of 71-69 in the first two rounds Friday before finishing with a 78 Saturday.

Oregon junior Andy Scheidt had a good tournament for the Ducks, shooting 73-72-76 to finish tied for 37th place. Paul Regali shot 72 in the final round to finish at 225, one shot ahead of teammate Randy McCracken. Freshman J.J. Astorquia shot 228. The Ducks have one more tournament, the U.S. Intercollegiate on April 23-25, before the Pac-10 Championships in May.

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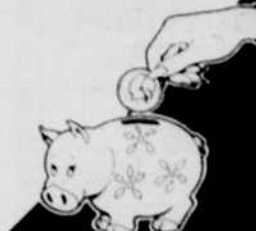
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
