tee members currently serving the first term of their two-year term to be grandfathered into the revamped Student Senate spots.

One of the seats, Seat 13 on the Student Senate position, has no candidates running. It will have to be filled by a write-in candidates.

Seat 18, the Senate's two-year graduate/law seat, and Seat 10, the Senate's two-year undeclared major seat are also not filled.

Write-in candidates need at least seven voters to write them in.

The ASUO elections board is also asking for observers for Wednesday's ballot count.

Anyone interested should file an "observer form" by 5 p.m. today with the ASUO elections board.

Counting has lasted up to 11 p.m.

The elections board also needs observers for the general primaries next week.

Those interested should file the form with the board by 5 p.m. April 27.

If candidates for president and vice president can't win a 50 percent plus one-vote consensus, then the top two vote-getters move onto the general elections.

The election also will fill seats for ASUO Programs Committee, EMU Board and ASPAC seats. Those three committee are only looking for at-large members.

Man with AIDS sentenced for sexual abuse

PORTLAND (AP) — A Gresham man who had sex with three women and sexually abused a 2-year-old girl after finding out he was infected with the AIDS virus was sentenced Monday to 69 years in prison.

Timothy A. Hinkhouse, 23, was convicted March 15 of 32 counts, including attempted murder, attempted assault, sexual abuse and recklessly endangering.

"Mr. Hinkhouse should be removed from the community for the longest period of time," Multnomah County Circuit Judge William C. Snouffer said in handing down the sentence.

Deputy District Attorney Dave Peters said the sentence practically guarantees he will never get out of prison to endanger anyone else.

"I've said all along that he's engaged in an intentional pattern of conduct. And we've held him
