

## Nixon noted for what he achieved

**Legacy:** Nixon will be remembered for much more than his resignation

WASHINGTON (AP) — Richard M. Nixon will always be remembered as the first president forced to resign. But this dubious distinction will share pages in U.S. history books with the bold policy strokes that marked his 5 1/2-year presidency.

Clearly, Nixon's overtures to China and the "detente" he achieved with the Soviet Union will long be viewed as Nixon's prime international policy achievements. But he also left a rich legacy of activist environmental and social programs.

Watergate aside, Nixon's accomplishments already are being viewed more substantially by many historians than those of the archrival who defeated him in his 1960 bid for the presidency, Democrat John F. Kennedy.

"He'll be remembered as one of the significant presidents of the century — both for good and for bad," said Bruce Buchanan, a political scientist at the University of Texas.

There is no denying that he will go down as one of the most fascinating and complex politicians of U.S. history.

"His contribution is really remarkable," said William P. Rogers, Nixon's first secretary of state and now a New York lawyer.

"He almost single-handedly made it possible for China to re-enter the world community. At the same time, he was able to

## Interest in counseling services increasing

**Center:** Staff members say rise in demand is surprising but they attribute it to several factors including education costs

The University Counseling Center has been so busy lately that it was difficult for staff members to even make time for an interview.

Weston Morrill, director of the center, discussed the reasons behind the increasing demand.

"It's difficult to know," Morrill said. "Our staff has been surprised by the increases." Morrill said stress is certainly a factor as students become more concerned about the costs of education, and some students worry that social forces are making the world less safe.

The purpose of the Counseling Center is to help students overcome personal and emotional blocks that can impede their success at the University. Campus support groups include Eating Disorders, International Students' Issues and Sexual Assault Survivors.

One of the ways the center has dealt with the increased demand for its services is to use pre-doctoral and pre-master's degree interns. The interns assist with the center's services and provide additional staff to meet the growing student needs.

Applicants from across the nation compete for the four pre-doctoral positions. Carolin Keutzer, training director, said the program is fiercely competitive. This means the University is able to attract outstanding candidates, she said.

Keutzer said that with full accreditation from the American Psychological Association, the program is able to exceed national standards for professional education and training in psychology.

The services the Counseling Center provides are wide and varied. When students need assistance, they can meet for an initial intake interview. People who are in crisis can return and are seen on a first-come, first-serve basis.

After assessing a student's needs, the center attempts

## Students for Choice conducts workshop

**Policy:** Group wants students to write letters to their representatives

Students for Choice is conducting a letter writing workshop to teach people how to write letters to legislators encouraging them to advocate a national health care policy that includes abortion services.

"Women are under a lot of pressure not to have abortions," said Jennifer Carter, co-director of Students for Choice. "There

has been legislation passed that makes it harder for women — for example, the mandatory 24-hour waiting period.

"We want to make abortion in the U.S. more accessible for everyone, especially low-income women because they're often overlooked in private health care packages," Carter said. "If abortion services are a part of a national policy, then it will reach more women."

Members of Students for Choice hope students will write letters to their local representa-

► PORTLAND (AP) — Even though 58 percent of the Oregonians who responded to a new poll want Sen. Bob Packwood to resign, a spokesman for the Oregon Republican said he is heartened by the figures.

Thirty-six percent of those who took part in the April 15-18 survey said Packwood should not resign.



That compares with 62 percent who believed he should resign in a February survey. Thirty-four percent in the earlier poll said he should not resign.

"I think opinion in this thing is pretty well set," said Tim Hibbitts, a partner in Davis & Hibbitts Inc., the Portland company that conducted the poll for *The Oregonian* and KATU-TV.
