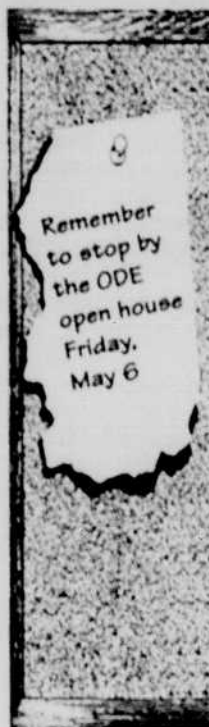

Environmental Awareness Workshops

Credit Classes are Still Available for Spring Term

RISK AND LIABILITY—APRIL 29-30

1 credit (LSS 408/508) Fee \$75

This workshop will cover areas such as standards, negligence, adventure recreation, protection issues, insurance choices and disputes, litigation, risk reduction, permission and release forms, accident reduction insurance, and contracts and contracted services.

TIDEPOLS—APRIL 22-24

2 credits (LSS 408/508) Fee \$150 plus \$30 travel

This workshop will concentrate on the tidepools and the variety of life that exists at the edge of the sea. Participants will examine the plant and animals above the spray zones and the recreational value of the many sites that are available. Participants will also study the reasons for the strict management, controversial issues and some of the thoughts behind actions currently being taken.

ADVENTURE RECREATION—MAY 6-8

2 credits (LSS 408/508) Fee \$150 plus \$30 travel

This workshop is designed to study the opportunities and reasonings of those people who wish to recreate closer to the edge of the margin of safety. Students will experience on-site observations and participation to analyze the impact on facilities, resources, equipment manufacturing and sales, insurance, and product liability. The class will also examine the effects on tourism and the entrepreneurial possibilities.

COASTAL LAKES—MAY 20-22

2 credits (LSS 408/508) Fee \$150 plus \$30 travel

Large and small lakes along Oregon's coast provide an interesting and informative field-lab for the study of plants, animals, history and geology. This workshop will explore preservation and use issues, recreational opportunities and resource values.
