First provost finalist speaks to faculty panel

Everly B. Fleisher, the first of four provost finalists to visit the University, talked about an "Institutional Vision for the Future" Wednesday to faculty panels, who are responsible for making recommendations to the provost search committee.

Fleisher, who is presently the Executive Vice Chancellor at the University of California, Riverside, discussed the importance of exceptional faculty and hardworking students as the base of quality education.

The provost is the University's top academic post and is in charge of allocating funds to academic units and approving faculty appointments, promotions and tenure decisions. The provost also serves as the chief executive officer in the absence of the president.

Fleisher believes an effective provost oversees "quality teaching and research, a diverse campus, the retention of a quality faculty and recruitment of qualified students."

Fleisher expressed the need for students to take a more active responsibility in their education.

"Students need to realize that getting an education is their responsibility and they need to take advantage of their faculty," he said. "How many of us have had office hours where no one came?"

While striving to increase the quality of the University for students, Fleisher would also try to make sure that faculty members continue to learn and grow through research, which they would in turn share with their students.

When discussing the relationship between research and teaching responsibilities, Fleisher said the two must go together.

"If research was stopped, the teaching would not get any better ... in fact it would get worse," he said.

In planning for faculty improvements at the University, Fleisher said he thinks faculty salaries at

the University must meet at least the average salary level from the American Association of Universities in the next 10 to 15 years.

He commented on the fact that faculty salaries at the University are among the lowest on the AAU list and are disproportionate among disciplines within the University.

A graduate of Yale University, Fleisher has served in many administrative and academic positions, including the dean of the College of Arts and Sciences and professor of chemistry at the University of Colorado at Boulder from 1980 to 1988.

Fleisher has published 97 articles for various chemistry journals in the past 38 years he has worked in the field. His most recent article was published in 1991 and addressed linked prophylin systems.

If chosen, Fleisher will replace the current provost, Norman Wessells, who has been provost since 1988. Wessells is returning to teaching and research in the biology department.

The 19-member search panel consists of University faculty, administrators, students, staff and community. Committee members were selected by their peers and appointed by committee chair Dave Frohnmayer, who is also the dean of the law school. The committee began the search in January.

Fleisher was one of four finalists picked from 117 applications and search panel-nominations.

The search panel will make its recommendations to University President Myles Brand, who will then submit the candidate for approval by the Oregon State board of Higher Education and Higher Education Chancellor Thomas Bartlett.

The decision will be made by the end of spring term, which will help foster stability while the interim president is in office during the 1994-95 school year.

Finalists Wallace D. Loh and Charles R. Middleton will be on campus next week. The third finalist, John Mosely, is the University's vice president in charge of research.
