

Group changes name, adds female members

Men Against Rape has changed its name to Men and Women Against Rape, to reflect the contributions women have made to the organization.

"We had a lot of women who were involved in the group, but they weren't receiving credit for the work that they had done," said Chris Scott, co-director of Men and Women Against Rape. "So we had changed the name to include them."

Scott and Melissa Adams, the other co-director of Men and Women Against Rape, hope that more people will become involved in the group.

"We honor our diversity but acknowledge our commonalities," Adams said. "We want to work together and cooperate with each other. Rape is everyone's problem."

Scott and Adams admitted that the transition hadn't been easy. They felt that they were thrown into the situation. The group also had to find a new emphasis.

"As Men Against Rape the emphasis was on men. It was about informing them about rape and the situations that allowed them to rape. There aren't any forums on this campus that really address the men. Now, the group has a new emphasis that includes women," Scott said.

Some members who didn't agree with the changes left the

group.

The fact that many students aren't involved in making this campus safer may be due to the fact that they don't realize how dangerous this campus is.

"Look up the statistics of rape on the this campus. Look at all the unofficial report forms. These only show a fraction of the rapes on this campus," Adams said.

One of the leading contributions to rape is power. "Rape is power over the victim or whether he or she can get away with it," Scott said. "Alcohol is involved many times. Sometimes this gives power over another person."

Adams believes men and women are taught the imbalance of power from childhood. We're ingrained with these messages from our parents.

"Rapists are created and not born," Adams said. "Men and women are raised to be powerful and submissive. Girls are given dolls and kitchen sets. These toys tell girls that they're to take care of others before themselves. Boys are given guns and trucks. These toys teach boys to be aggressive, to put themselves before others. This creates the imbalance of power. Rape is only that vehicle to power."

Both Scott and Adams want women to realize that they aren't responsible if they're raped. Men have a lot of power that can be used to stop rape.

Take Our Daughters to Work Day brings young women to University

In honor of national "Take Our Daughters to Work" Day, the University hosted daughters, granddaughters, nieces and friends of employees who wanted to join the work force for a day.

Over 150 employees and daughters participated in Thursday's program.

Take Our Daughters to Work Day activities started with almost 60 girls, mostly middle school students, participating in work sessions around campus. Work sessions allowed the girls to visit areas of campus other than where their parents worked. For example, girls could chose

sessions in an area that fit their interests or career goals. Sessions included neurobiology, computers, sports medicine and business administration.

Daughters were able to tour labs, offices and classrooms. The chemistry department took two daughters on a tour of the laser laboratory. In the neurobiology department, a researcher showed the girls the nervous system of a caterpillar and discussed how the nervous system changes during metamorphosis.

According to 12-year-old Mindy McArthur, the best thing she did during her tour of the campus radio station was to play songs and talk on the radio. Yet

she doesn't want to be a deejay because "they play weird music," she said.

The program gives young women a chance to think about their futures and to develop goals and dreams, according to Jan Oliver, associate vice president of administration at the University and a member of the 4-J school board.

"The reason why this is so important," said Oliver in an address welcoming the girls, "is that not all of us knew where we were going or what we were doing when we were growing up. We had no idea what it would mean to be an adult. To have a dream about where you want to go

in life is powerful."

Some daughters came just to see what their parents do all day, while others came to explore their career goals and see what the "real world" is like. Maxine Chandonnet is thinking about becoming a librarian, so she came with her grandmother to tour the library. Shantell Cammack said that besides getting out of school, she wanted to come so that she could see what her mom does all day.

Besides being able to share their parents' schedule for a day, the girls are also shown different career options. "I wanted to see what kind of jobs women can have," said 13-year-old Jessie Turner.
