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Women try to even dual record

The Oregon women's track and field team has a couple of things to worry about this weekend when it takes to the Hayward Field track with Boise State and Nevada-Las Vegas on Saturday.

First, the Ducks are faced with the prospect of finishing the season below .500 in dual meets. That has never happened before, and head coach Tom Heinonen is hoping it won't happen this year either.

The Ducks are 1-3 in dual meets this season.

"The first thing we want to do is win the meet so we end up with a .500 record for the season," Heinonen said. "We've never finished below .500 and that would be a nice way to finish up the scoring portion of the season."

Then comes the qualifying dilemma that faces the Ducks.

Coming into this weekend, Oregon has one automatic qualifier for the NCAA meet and four provisional qualifiers.

But with the Pacific-10 Conference meet only two weeks away, the Ducks know they will be in trouble unless they can add to the team they will take to the Pac-10 meet.

The Pac-10 allows a team to enter 24 athletes in the confer-

ence championships. So far, the Ducks have qualifiers in 18 events, with only 11 athletes scheduled to make the trip at this point.

The only problem is that, barring some breakthrough performances, Oregon has nearly used up its possibilities for potential qualifiers.

For Saturday's meet, Heinonen is hoping the competition in the sprints especially will make for some good times for the Ducks.

"What we're looking for is some pretty fair sprinters from both Boise State and UNLV and a chance to put some good marks on the board," Heinonen said. "If we can do that, then that will help us get the performances we need to qualify more people for the Pac-10 meet."

Both Oregon relay teams are coming off strong performances two weeks ago when each of them posted season-best times. Jamila Godfrey, Nicole Commissiong, Shawna Krasowski and Lisa Bedwell will do the work in the 4x100-meter team, and Nilka Thomas will replace Godfrey in the 4x400-meter race.

In the distance races, freshman Milena Glusac, who has already reached provisional NCAA qualifying times in the 3,000 and 5,000, will give the 1,500 a shot after missing the race two weeks ago because of

the flu. Glusac will need to trim two seconds off her lifetime best to qualify for the NCAA in the event. She will also compete in the 3,000.

Kelsey Stellick has a provisional qualifier in the javelin but will probably need a better distance to assure herself a shot at the NCAA.

Senior Kelly Blair has already qualified for the NCAA in the heptathlon and is a provisional qualifier in the 100 hurdles. Saturday, Blair will compete in the long jump, high jump, 100-meter hurdles and 400-meter hurdles.

Saturday's meet begins at 12:10 p.m. with the javelin and will conclude about 4 p.m. with the 4x400-meter relay.

In other women's track developments, the team announced Wednesday that it has acquired two of the top high school track athletes in the Northwest.

Jennifer Thomas of Prairie High School in Brush Prairie, Wash., is a former state AA long jump champion. Liz Howell of Beaverton High School is ranked fourth in the state in both the 1,500 and 3,000 meters.

Both signed national letters of intent earlier this week and will join the Oregon team in the fall.

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track event under 10,000 meters except for the 400 meters and the 110-meter hurdles. LaVon Pierce and Patrick Khoo will take a shot at the qualifying mark and at Henri Peyou of Washington State in Saturday's 400-meter race.

The shorter track events and relays are important to Oregon's chances for victory over the Cougars and Boise State, the third team in the triangular meet. With Dino Philyaw and LaMont Woods returning from football drills, the Oregon sprint group should be at full strength.

Oregon athletes have the top marks in both the 100 and the 200 coming into the meet. The return of Philyaw and Woods means that Oregon can field

its best 4x100 team.

In the 400 hurdles, the season bests of Sol Sallos of Oregon and James Swanson of Washington State are just .15 seconds apart. Each team has an NCAA provisional qualifier in hammer. Dan Zorich of Oregon has a season best of 199 feet, 7 inches, compared to 211 feet, 10 inches for Matt Shaffer of Washington State.

Besides Zorich, Oregon has five NCAA provisional qualifiers. They are Johnson and Nicholas (1,500 meters), Ray Livingston (decathlon), Karl Keska (5,000) and Dusty Carlson (shot put). The Ducks have qualified 18 athletes covering 23 events for the conference meet.

Saturday's meet begins at 12:30 p.m. and concludes with the 4x400 relay at 4:00 p.m.
