Mother hopes to donate liver to ill daughter



PORTLAND (AP) — Cindy Harms' attempt to deliver her youngest child in time to save her eldest daughter with a liver transplant failed Saturday night.

"We're bummed," said Cindy's husband, Roger Harms. "We are hoping for Sunday. It has to be as soon as possible."

Cindy Harms was in labor from 7 a.m. until about 9 p.m. at Willamette Falls Hospital, but without success.

"This baby has been in breech position three times," she said. "We have to move it while it is positioned right. If I have a Caesarean, I can't have the surgery to be a liver donor for six or seven weeks."

Cindy Harms hopes to donate part of her liver to her 20-month-old daughter Aerial, who has been nearing total liver shutdown since January.

"They would take my lower left lateral lobe," the girl's mother said. "The doctors say that it would rejuvenate into a whole, healthy liver. As soon as I have the baby, I start a whole set of tests to see if I match."

A matching child's liver would be best, Roger Harms said, but if Cindy Harms qualifies as a donor, the timing would not be as critical.

On Friday, Aerial slept in Cindy's arms until she was put into her crib, head down, on her stomach,

ankles crossed.

"Her liver and spleen are so swollen, it's the only position she can breathe in and sleep," her father said.

Aerial lives with a feeding tube in her left side. A port in her chest lets her receive intravenous medication. She gets oxygen through a tube under her nose, and her pulse and respiration are monitored.

Aerial is a patient at Legacy Emanuel Hospital in Portland, where her room also contains two beds for her parents.

"We live here," Roger Harms said. "We've become father and mother nurses. We've become incredibly medical since January."

Cindy Harms' due date is May 12, but the couple fear every moment counts.

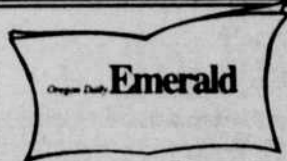
When the call comes that a liver is available, the family will have four to six hours to fly to California Pacific Medical Center in San Francisco.

"There is no air service from Portland to San Francisco between midnight and 6 a.m., so we have a charter jet lined up," Roger Harms said.

It is coincidence that one child's dire illness and another child's birth have come on Mother's Day, Cindy Harms said.

Doctors also induced labor May 2, but "ten hours labor and no baby," she said. "It really makes you want to rush back in and do it again."

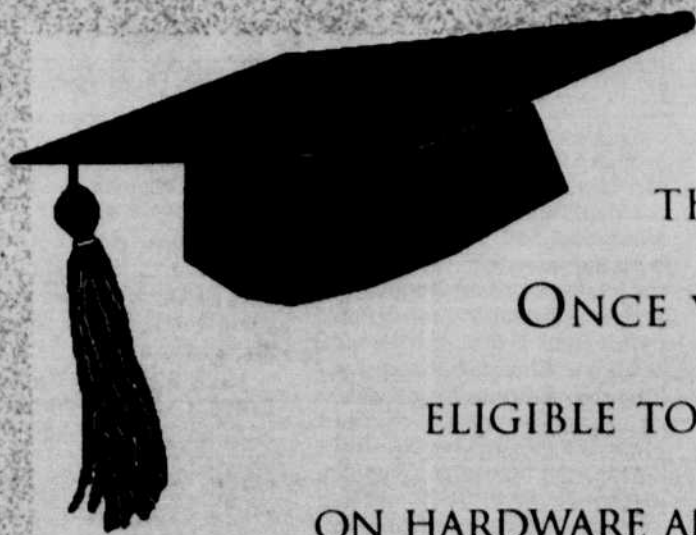
The couple feel their bad fortune has been mixed with good.



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
