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appear to have any serious competition in the race to succeed Brand. The possibility of Frohnmayer replacing Brand on a permanent basis has generated strong speculation, as well.

"His extraordinarily strong academic credentials, combined with his experience as both dean of the UO School of Law since 1992 and as UO professor for nine years, have given him valuable insight into the institution," said Chancellor Thomas Bartlett. "The support for his appointment from UO faculty, staff and students is a most promising beginning."

Support for Frohnmayer has been strong since former University law Dean Maurice Holland stepped down in 1991. Faculty support for Frohnmayer to replace Holland led them to write a letter that almost every faculty member signed asking Frohnmayer to accept the position. He has maintained the position since January 1992.

During his tenure as the law school dean, the University has received national recognition after being ranked by academics, judges and practitioners as having the best law program in Oregon and the second best in Pacific Northwest. According to the March 1994 survey published by *U.S. News and World Report*, the University's entering 1993 class was in the top 25 nationally, based on its cumulative grade-point average, and was one of the few to have more than 50 percent women enrolled.

In addition to these achievements, four endowed professorships have been created, curricular offerings were increased, student-faculty ratios have been dramatically reduced and annual donations have grown by 50 percent.

Because of the strong support and contributions that Frohnmayer has achieved during his stay at the University, President Myles Brand said Wednesday that he had complete confidence in leaving Frohnmayer to take over his current position.

"We have a person at the helm here that has a quality of leadership and commitment that is sec-

ond to none," Brand said. "I can't think of a better person to head the University at this time."

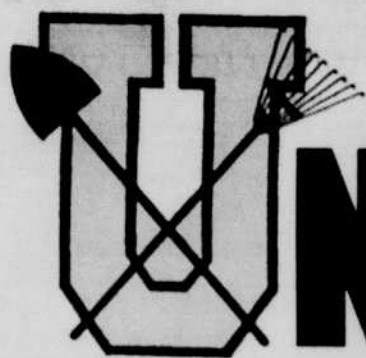
Bobby Lee, a member of the state board and 1993 ASUO president who made the motion to name Frohnmayer as the interim president Wednesday, said students, faculty and alumni were unified in their support of Frohnmayer.

Frohnmayer's academic and political background during the past 30 years dates back to when Frohnmayer was a professor of law and special assistant to the president at the University from 1971-1979. In 1981, Frohnmayer was Oregon's Attorney General who represented Oregon before the Supreme Court, winning six of seven cases — the most cases and the best record of any state attorney general in modern times. He left the position in 1992 after becoming dean of the law school.

A Harvard graduate and Rhodes scholar, Frohnmayer earned his law degree at the University of California at Berkeley. He is a member of the Board of Directors of the National Marrow Donor Program and founded the Fanconi Anemia Research Fund, Inc. with his wife, Lynn Frohnmayer.

He currently serves as adviser to the fund and its associated worldwide support group.

No decision has been made about whether Frohnmayer will be replaced as dean of the law school or if he will serve in both posts. Frohnmayer did mention during his acceptance speech however that an interim dean for the law school would likely be found sometime in the near future.
