The Oregon men's team had other highlights in the meet. Dan Zorich moved up the NCAA provisional list in the hammer with a personal-record throw of 201 feet, 6 inches. Lance Deal, the United States' top-ranked hammer thrower, won the event with a throw 261 feet even.

DeWayne Ingram ran the fastest 100 meters of the year by an Oregon athlete. His mark of 10.4 won the 100 meters and equaled an NCAA provisional qualifier in the event. Eric Trice finished a tenth of a second behind.

Oregon's 4x100-meter relay team ran a season-best of 40.39 seconds, about a half-second short of an NCAA provisional mark.

Chris Nelson equaled his career best in the high jump but fell short on his attempts at 7 feet, 2 inches. Nelson finished at 7 feet, 1/2 inch.

The Ducks travel to Pullman, Wash., for the Pacific-10 Conference Championships on Friday and Saturday.

Women qualify two for NCAAAs

The Oregon women's track and field team added two automatic qualifiers to its NCAA roster, and the fans at Hayward Field got a chance to see some of the best distance and mid-distance runners in the world.

So went Saturday's Oregon Twilight meet.

The Ducks now will prepare for the Pacific-10 Conference meet, which begins Friday in Pullman, Washington.

But with their Pac-10 roster pretty much set, the Ducks were hoping to get a few more qualifiers for the NCAA meet. And that's exactly what they got.

Freshman Milena Glusac went up against American record-holder Annette Peters and a field loaded with Olympians and former Duck greats in the 5,000. She was the top college finisher and also reached an NCAA automatic qualifying time of 16:19.83. Glusac also has a provisional qualifying time in the 3,000.

Kelsey Stellick came into the meet with a provisional qualifier in the javelin but destroyed her previous personal best by 14 feet with a throw of 173-1 on her fifth throw of the day.

Two races, the 5,000 and a special 1,200-meter race, were the highlights of the women's part of meet.

Peters won the 5,000 fairly easily over Trina Painter and Sammie Gdowski.

Peters had been on the mend for the past month and Saturday was her first return to the track.

"I had a stomachache all day," she said. "But that's good. It shows I still have that competitiveness."

The 1,200-meter race matched Olympians Suzy Hamilton and Patti Sue Plummer, the fastest 800-meter runner in the world, Maria Mutola and former Nebraska star Fran ten Bensel.

Hamilton and Mutola broke away from the pack after the second lap and Mutola left Hamilton behind after the second turn and cruised the rest of the way.

"I didn't have any idea what the 1,200 would be like," Mutola said. "I'm happy with how I ran. Next week I have a big race in New York, so this is like the beginning of the season for me."

Oregon's two redshirt sprinters, Camara Jones and LaReina Woods, made appearances at the meet. Jones won the 800 and Woods took first in the 100.

Other Duck winners Saturday were Mary Gilbert in the 100 hurdles, Lisa Bedwell in the 400, Grace Upshaw in the long jump, Amo Olson in the high jump, Alison Breedlove in the 400-hurdles and Sara Howell in the triple jump.

Blair successfully defends title

Kelly Blair successfully defended her Pacific-10 Conference heptathlon championship, but Ray Livingston failed to clear a height in the pole vault and finished fifth in the decathlon in Pullman, Wash., over the weekend.

Blair won four of seven events and defeated her closest competitor, Rebecca Butt of Arizona, by more than 400 points (5,527 to 5,085).

Blair took first in the 100-meter hurdles with a time of 14.14, the long jump (19-0 1/2), the 800 meters (2:24.15) and the 200 (24.85).

Blair had a 200-point lead after the first day of competition

on Saturday and used the victories in the long jump and 800 on Sunday to bury the competition.

Nicole Haynes of Southern California took third with 5,025 points and was followed by Arizona State's Tricia Melfy with 4,909.

Blair's victory gives the Ducks 10 points in the Pac-10 team competition, which begins Friday in Pullman. Blair will compete in a number of individual events this weekend.

In the decathlon, Livingston was in second place and Pappas was fifth after the first day of competition. Travis Clark of Stanford led Livingston by 110 points going into Sunday's

events.

Clark won the high hurdles to begin the day; Pappas was third and Livingston was fourth. Livingston won the discus and took the lead in the competition.

Livingston and Pappas, who was third with three events left, both failed to clear a height in the pole vault. Clark finished the day with a second place finish in the javelin and a first place in the 1,500 meters to win the competition.

Clark finished with 6,982 points, compared to 6,298 for Livingston and 5,715 for Pappas. Livingston finished fifth and Pappas finished sixth.

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
