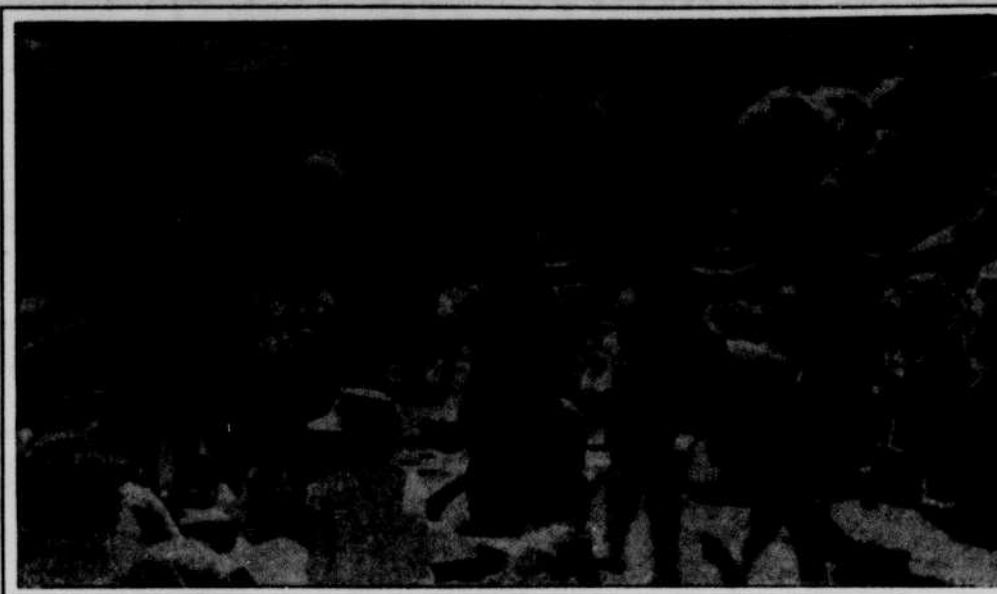

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van that was parked near her apartment that was also suspicious. She later reported the van to the Westmoreland Area Office.

"It was just weird the way they positioned themselves," Bowker said, remembering that the van was parked perpendicular to some parked cars on West 16th Avenue, "like they could speed off when they needed to."

The driver, a brown-haired white male, called out, "Hey, that's a cute kid," Bowker said.

"I didn't think of it at the time. I was just trying to get to school."

Because of news of an attempted kidnapping, some residents were seriously considering a neighborhood watch program. They feel that the girl's story could be a catalyst to drive previously apathetic residents into action.

Tymothy Montgomery, University Family Housing program assistant, said she will still try to organize a block watch if enough people are interested.

"(The attempted kidnapping) might not have happened, but it very well could have," Montgomery said. "We should at least have a community watch to lessen our fears."

When residents find out that the girl lied about the attempted kidnapping, Montgomery was concerned some residents might think twice about participating in the block watch program, she said.

"This is kind of like the little girl who cried

wolf," Montgomery said. "Now if something really happens, there may not be anyone to help."

Stephanie Oppenlander, student office manager for Westmoreland Family Housing said, "There still is cause to start a neighborhood watch program, but it's just been really hard to get off the ground in the past."

Oppenlander said crime has always been a problem at Westmoreland, with the biggest problem being stolen bikes and automobile break-ins.

In the past two years, there have also been two cars thefts, a burglary and an alleged rape, according to Westmoreland records.

"I think she was scared," Oppenlander said about the girl. "She probably got a lot of attention and went with it."

The girl's mother said, "I'm very humiliated and embarrassed by it, but it's better to err on the side of caution."

She thanked Sheri Donahoe, Westmoreland Area director, for canvassing the community with flyers warning residents about possible kidnappers roaming the community.

As far as the block watch program, Montgomery still plans to go door-to-door to build support.

Montgomery also plans to speak at a Westmoreland community party this Saturday at 5 p.m. to get more volunteers for the program. The party will be between 16th Avenue and 15th Court, and Montgomery said all family housing residents are invited.
